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How to Use This Book

Unless you are a masochist, you won't enjoy it when the words you choose make you sound dull, arrogant, insensitive, immature, vague, abrupt, antagonistic, uneducated, negative, old-fashioned, or anything else that is equally unimpressive. But that's what happens to many of us when we fail to understand and profit from the power of words. The Complete Word Book will help you avoid these and other embarrassing mistakes. Not only does it provide an extensive compilation of helpful and harmful words, it is also a practical guide to the crucial matter of word choice. Indeed, it's like having many books—grammar, writing, spelling, style, word use/abuse dictionaries, and much more—all in one.

The Complete Word Book categorizes and lists all sorts of words (positive, negative, trite, slang, and many more) for quick and easy reference. Because most entries in its sixty-five chapters are arranged alphabetically, you can immediately draw on the word lists for every imaginable purpose. Whether you want to write a thank-you letter, to apply for a new job, to make a speech, to write a report, or to do anything else that requires words, you will find here an abundance of the "right" words to use as well as the "wrong" ones to avoid.

To get the greatest benefit possible from this book, first consider your weak points in spoken and written language.

Do you have trouble with spelling (chapters 41-48)?

Grammar (Chapters 24-34)?

Capitalization (Chapter 35)?

What about word choice; for example, do you say *infer* when you mean *imply* (Chapter 23)?

Do your messages sound tired and passive (Chapters 11, 15, 32)? Is your tone negative (Chapter 7)?

Do you tend to repeat words and phrases too often (Chapter 12)? Are you unintentionally using discriminatory language (Chapter 6)? Do you sometimes use the wrong preposition (Chapter 28)?

Turn to the chapters pertaining to each problem on your list. There you'll find numerous lists and examples, as well as definitions and rules, that will help you make the right choice every time.

Because of the way the book is organized—with lists and examples—you will be able to select the word you need simply and quickly. For instance:

Assume that you are writing a letter to a client in which you want to sound vigorous and positive. Select words from the various chapters in Part I, "Words That Work," especially Chapter 5, "Action Words for Productive Messages." At the same time, edit out of your letter words from Part II, "Words to Avoid," especially Chapter 7, "Negative Words and Phrases," and Chapter 10, "Vague Words."

Follow this procedure with other written and spoken material such as business messages, speeches, reports, and various types of nonfiction or fiction.

The Complete Word Book contains sixty-seven chapters organized in twelve easy-to-use parts:

In The Complete Word Book you will find familiar topics such as words that please . . . words that antagonize . . . words that add variety . . . words that are discriminatory . . . words that are too general . . . words that are cliches . . . words that are easily confused. You'll also find less familiar subjects,

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such as *oxymorons*, *slang*, *homophones*, and *neologisms*. Also included are numerous chapters with practical tips about the grammar, spelling, and style of words as well as eight chapters concerning abbreviated forms of words and seven chapters dealing with the proper use of foreign words and phrases. Chapter 65 has a large collection of quotable famous words to draw on for use in speeches and various written material. The reference section that follows consists of a medley of words and terms ranging from the names of the principal languages of the world to the Latin terms for North American mammals. The book concludes with a glossary of terms pertaining to language and word usage.

The Complete Word Book is intended for anyone whose speech consists of more than a grunt and whose written messages are more demanding than a grocery list. It is for people who simply enjoy words as well as those who realize that they must use words more carefully and judiciously to improve their social or professional status. The Complete Word Book is a practical guide to everything you need to know about words and how to use them properly and effectively.

Words That Please

Certain words that we hear or read make us feel good. Perhaps they increase our self-esteem; perhaps they motivate us to do something we need or want to do; perhaps they alleviate stress or a feeling of apprehension about something we must face; or perhaps they simply help to promote happy feelings, a sense of excitement, or general well-being and confidence. Such words and expressions are positive by definition or in the context in which they are used. The following list contains examples of words you can use to make others feel better and to make your comments sound more positive. For words that have the opposite impact, see Chapter 7.

The Use of Synonyms for Variety

Business and social writers often search for just the right word to express an idea, or they may want to find substitutes for a word to avoid boring repetition of the same expression. The following list of synonyms includes selected examples of words that can be substituted in letters, reports, and other material to make your writing more interesting and varied. Some writers, however, may want to repeat the same word for emphasis (see Chapter 4). Using obscure synonyms merely for the sake of diversity suggests affectation and can be counterproductive, but, when chosen wisely, they can add spice to your writing and conversation.

accept: receive, acquire, gain, agree
