

Northern Rebellion in favour of Mary, Queen of Scots, breaks out.

1570	July 8 Elizabeth excommunicated by Pope Pius V.
1572	June 2 Execution of Earl of Norfolk, Catholic conspirator. Aug. 24 Massacre of Saint Bartholomew's Day; Huguenots seek refuge in England.
1573	Graduates with BA degree from Cambridge. Pierre Ronsard publishes Sonnets Pour Hélène in France; Torquato Tasso publishes Gerusalemme Liberata in Italy.
1573-5	Attempts to colonise Ulster half-heartedly supported by Elizabeth.
1576	Awarded MA degree. March 15 Puritan MP Peter Wentworth imprisoned in the Tower of London after he claims that free speech should exist in Parliament. First public theatre built in London.
1577	Possibly in Ireland, as Irenius in A View of the Present State of Ireland claims that he witnesses the execution of Murrogh O'Brien at Limerick in July. May Archbishop Grindal placed under house arrest after refusal to suppress 'prophesyings' at queen's command.
1578	Secretary to John Young, Bishop of Rochester (Kent).
1578-81	Elizabeth contemplates marriage to François, Duke of Alençon.
1579	In service with the Earl of Leicester as a confidential emissary. Oct. 27 Marries Maccabaeus Chylde in Westminster with whom he will have two children, Sylvanus and Katherine. Nov. 2 Earl of Desmond proclaimed traitor after his rebellion. Nov. 3 John Stubbs loses his right hand after publishing a book arguing against Elizabeth's proposed marriage to Alençon. Dec. 5 The Shepheardes Calender is entered into the Stationers' Register and subsequently published. Some of Spenser's lost works – Court of Cupide, Dreams, Pageaunts, and the critical treatise, The English Poete – probably composed at this time.
1580	Publication of correspondence with Harvey in two volumes: Three proper, and wittie, familiar Letters and Two other, very

commendable Letters, of the same mens writing. Mention of The Fairie Queene for the first time, and of other lost works (Epithalamion Thamesis, Dying Pellicane, Nine Comedies). Aug. 12 Arrives in Dublin having become secretary to Arthur Lord Grey de Wilton, the new Lord Deputy.

Nov. 10 Grey massacres Irish rebels at Fort d'Oro, Smerwick. Spenser may have witnessed the event.

Sir Philip Sidney, Astrophil and Stella (published 1591) and Apology for Poetry (published 1595) in MS circulation.

 Appointed to civil service jobs in Dublin and leases land in Wexford.

 Munster Rebellion at its height.
- Leases more land in Kildare and is accorded the rank of gentleman.

 Aug. 31 Lord Grey recalled from Ireland probably because of his harsh methods of dealing with the Munster Rebellion.

 Sir Walter Raleigh's poetry circulates at court.
- Successful career as civil servant. Friendly with other English writers in Ireland (Barnaby Rich, Geoffrey Fenton and Barnaby Googe).
- Death of Earl of Desmond and end of Munster Rebellion.
- Sir Richard Genville's voyage to establish colonies in the Americas. Elizabeth grants aid to the Dutch against the Spanish.
- 1586 Oct. 17 Death of Sir Philip Sidney in Zutphen, Netherlands.
- Feb. 8 Execution of Mary, Queen of Scots.

 May 8 Raleigh attempts to establish colonies in the Americas.

 Christopher Marlowe's Tamburlaine, Parts I and II
