You own who you really are and the purpose that only you can fulfill for the world—if you choose to own your purpose. In alignment with purpose, you activate a powerful catalyst to your spiritual growth.

In this book, you learn that work is one of the best catalysts for spiritual growth. Those who know how to turn work into a highly spiritual activity are better able to embrace the unlimited power of the divine. Whether your workplace has become unsupportive, or discouraging, or even fearful, you learn from others, just like yourself, that there is hope. Through the lives of people in every workplace environment, you gain support and insight for making your worklife work for you.

Further, by serving others you learn how angels make the kind of difference we so desperately need in our world today. 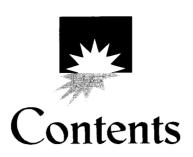

The Seven Beliefs of Powerful Workplace Angels

In 1981, Steve Mariotti was mugged by five teenagers. Reflecting afterwards that they looked as though they came from disadvantaged communities, he decided to help kids like the ones who attacked him. He decided to teach disadvantaged youths. Even though he held an MBA from the University of Michigan and had worked in the corporate world as a financial analyst and later a small-business owner, he took a teaching position in special education at a high school in the Morrisania section of the Bronx.

His mission of helping grew stronger as he noticed that the most resistant youths in his class, the young men, grew interested in their schoolwork when he spoke about the basics of starting their own business. With this insight, he acquired a \$20,000 grant from the Boys and Girls Clubs of Newark and launched the National Foundation for Teaching Entrepreneurship (NFTE) in 1987. His goal was to improve society by teaching young people to start and operate their own small businesses.

According to a 1994 Gallup survey, 69 percent of high school students are interested in starting a business. Steve's firsthand experience confirms this data. To date, NFTE has helped more than eighteen thousand young people start businesses. The program is currently offered in fourteen cities in the United States. According to Bobby Austin, program officer

of the W. K. Kellogg Foundation, extensive research shows the NFTE program to be a national leader in the field of youth entrepreneurship education.

As Steve says, "What other NFTE teachers and I have observed is that our students are less likely to have unwanted pregnancies and more likely to graduate from high school, develop self-esteem, and go to college. There is something about learning to start and operate one's own small business that is very inspiring for these young people."

Through the NFTE program—which includes entrepreneurial basics such as cost-benefit analysis, record keeping, advertising, and marketing—teens get the help they need to grow successful small businesses. "Teaching entrepreneurship is the single most important thing we can do to improve the lives of the poor," he says. As one young graduate of NFTE states, "My dream is not to die in poverty but to have poverty die in me."

Steve's passion to bring a new vision to troubled children in inner cities drives his daily work. When asked what makes a graduate successful, he quickly replies, "NFTE is just a tiny part compared to our students' spirituality, personal discipline, love, courage, and hope." He also sees all seven of the "angel beliefs" that this book discusses as important to his life's work, which is to create value in the marketplace by providing economic literacy for every child. "Thirteen million children live in poverty," he says. "If they learn the principles of wealth creation and ownership just as they learn their multiplication tables, we would find a world filled with more creative, passionate, and purposeful people." Right now there are only ten thousand kids graduating yearly in economic literacy programs like the one his organization runs. Together with partnerships with such corporations as Microsoft, NFTE can now implement creative processes that include replicating its program on the Internet. This allows schools to access a significant part of the program at a much lower cost.
