



### Tie-ran-oh-sore-us rex






Imagine this is your house. Your bedroom is here.



You're doing some homework. You look out of the window and see ...








# T. rex was probably the biggest, scariest, meat-eating creature that EVER lived!




#### You can see it had:

- titchy arms for, er, ... well, nobody really knows what they were for.








# T. rex is a big head


T. rex might have looked a bit stupid, but it was actually a bit of a smarty pants.

T. rex had a great big brain – for a dinosaur.

But its brain wasn't all that much bigger than your dad's – take a look:




And a brainy dinosaur wasn't brilliant at reading, writing and maths. T. rex needed a great big brain to make it good at seeing, hearing and smelling.

T. rex carried its brain in its great big head. And a T. rex skull was so big, it had to have holes, or "windows" so the head wasn't too heavy for its neck.
