

#### Note on the romanisation of place names and other words

Except in references and in quotations, all place names are given in accordance with the following principles. Village names are given using the Wade-Giles system which was in use during the period of the lease. A table of equivalents in both pinyin and Chinese characters is given below. Other place names are given using a spelling recognisable at the time, e.g. 'Shantung', 'Kwangchouwan', 'Tsinan', 'Talien' and 'Tientsin' ('Shandong', 'Guangzhouwan', 'Jinan', 'Dalian' and 'Tianjin' respectively in pinyin romanisation). The exception to this rule is 'Weihaiwei', which has been rendered in pinyin. The place referred to as Kiaochou (Jiaozhou in pinyin) is now more commonly referred to as Qingdao, whilst Port Arthur and Chefoo, were and are still known as Lüshun and Yentai respectively (Lushun and Yantai in pinyin). Chinese terms are given in pinyin.




