This book of exercise material deals with one of the major problems that English presents to the foreign learner. The behaviour of English prepositions and adverbs is often not capable of helpful analysis and the teacher more often than not, when asked for guidance, is obliged to say 'It is so because it is so.' This book offers some very general guide lines.

The book also offers many easily accessible exercises which can be used with a class whenever particular difficulties with prepositions and adverbs arise. These exercises offer controlled practice which is the only real way greater mastery can be achieved.

The book is intended for students who have a fair command of English, but find difficulties with this area of it.
