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The Synonym Finder

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INTRODUCTION

There have been many synonym books and thesauri. I have worked with and used most of them, but I have also found that they either do not provide enough up-to-date synonyms per key-word, or are arranged in a manner that makes them difficult to use, and necessitates an exasperating amount of page-turning in searching out a confusing number of cross-references. In this book we have tried to remedy both failings. We have compiled many more synonyms than contained in any other book, and have placed them in the one place where they belong—under the word that is being looked up.

In order to augment the number of words in each group we have taken the license of including many words that may not be exact synonyms but are very close in meaning to the key-word under which they are listed. This entailed the use of a kind of magnifying focus to attract quantities of near-synonyms and words related by either extension of meaning or subdivision of connotation (secondary, implied meanings) to the specific key-word to which you would most naturally refer. Thus, for example, where other existing dictionaries of synonyms would cross-reference boat by directing you to leaf out over a vexatious number of pages for an examination of the material under ship (or refer you from the word man to other related words contained under mankind, servant, etc.), we have in both cases and under all similar circumstances gathered all this related matter under the first key-word to which you would be most likely to direct your first attention.

Within the contents listed under each individual key-word, the subdivision (if any) into sub-classes according to various classifications of meaning (e.g., 1, 2, 3, etc.) follows the method of procedure of the excellent American College Dictionary (Random House) in putting the commonest, most literal and most modern meanings first, in category 1, and all other meanings (figurative, transferred, specialized, rare, and obsolete or archaic) under subsequent numerical groupings (2, 3, 4, etc.). Thus, though the words given preferred billing by being placed in early categories merit this priority because they have been selected on the basis of frequency and currency of usage, we caution you to remember that one word may have a variety of different meanings and that other words may be its synonyms in one sense but not in another. You should, therefore, examine carefully all the various subdivisional meanings of a word; do not merely take the first one. You must carefully sift out all the meanings in order to find the one that will fit best into the context you have in mind.
