### 内容提要

### 前 言

在多年的大学英语教学实践中,我们发现许多学生常为四、六级英语考试中出现的难题而苦恼。这些难题已成为学生们提高自己的语言水平和通过四、六级考试的主要障碍。为了帮助学生攻克这个学习难关,我们对历年来披露的四、六级及类似水平的英语考试试卷中出现的各种疑难题目进行了分析和归纳,并博采同类书之长,汇编成《大学英语四、六级攻坚 1600 题》一书。

全书分为两部分: 第一部分为 1600 道疑难练习题。第二部分为答案及注释。

本书使用的 1600 道练习题均选自近年来英美等国家的著作、报刊,内容新颖,题材广泛,遍及文化教育、社会生活、天文地理、风土人情和科普常识等领域,使读者在提高解题能力的同时,也能获得相关的知识。

本书对绝大部分题目都作了注释,并附有参考译文。此外,还提供了某些常用词及惯用法的相关知识供读者参阅。

本书按照《大学英语教学大纲》的要求,力求设计的练习句句切中学生解题中的难点。同时,书中针对难点进行了必要的分析讲解,并介绍了某些临场解题的实用技巧。

本书单词覆盖面广,使用了绝大部分的四级词汇,这是依据大学英语教学大纲词表调整工作组编的最新《大学英语教学大纲通用词汇表》(1-4级)而挑选的,同时选择了一部分经常使用的六级词汇。编写中注意了这些单词在练习中的重复率,以确保使用本书的读者能熟练掌握这批与四、六级英语考试相关的单词、习语和动词短语。

本书不仅适合大学本科生、研究生使用,对专科生及有志通过自学,参加相应英语水平考试的广大考生也会有很大的帮助。

由干我们水平有限、不当之处在所难免、热诚欢迎广大读者批评指正。
