





He wanted to live. And to live in the North he knew he must become the strongest dog of all.

#### **Buck and Spitz**

The men and the nine dogs had to travel five hundred miles. Buck did his job. Each day he pulled the sledge. He became stronger and stronger. Spitz, the leader, didn't like Buck. Spitz knew Buck wanted to be the leader of the dogs.

At the end of one long day, the dogs sat down to go to sleep. Buck and Spitz were angry with each other. Both dogs knew they would soon fight to the death.

Then the dogs heard some noises. They moved from their holes in the snow to see what was happening. They saw their food being eaten by a group of strange dogs. François, Perrault, and the nine dogs ran to the food tent.

The strange dogs were very hungry. There were about thirty of them. They were eating the food as quickly as they could. Buck had never seen dogs like these. They were so thin that you could see their bones under their skin.

Buck and the others attacked the strangers. But the 'thirty thieves' were so hungry they didn't run away. A fight started. François and Perrault hit the strange dogs with sticks. But the dogs got much of the food. Then they ran from the camp. Buck, Spitz and the other seven lay in the snow, tired and bleeding.

Perrault and François let the dogs rest for one day after the fight. When the dogs felt better they started on their five hundred mile journey again. Day after day they pulled the sledge.

Sometimes Spitz tried stealing Buck's food. Buck would attack but François always stopped the two dogs from fighting. The other seven dogs knew that there would soon be a big fight. It was very simple.

Buck wanted to be the leader of the dogs. One day it happened.

Buck was walking around the edge of the camp. Spitz attacked him. He bit Buck's throat, then his face. Buck was angry, very angry. It was time for the fight.

Both animals knew it was a fight to the death. Buck ran at Spitz. Spitz pulled away then jumped on Buck's back and bit his neck. Buck knocked him on to the ground. He put his teeth into Spitz's neck and killed him.

The other seven dogs came to Buck and licked him. Buck stood and looked at the other dogs. He was their new leader. He was the wildest and strongest dog of all.

#### A change of job


