



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#### A Ship's Doctor

#### A student of medicine

My father had five sons. I was the third. When I was fourteen he sent me to Cambridge to study. I was there for three years. Then he did not have enough money to pay my teachers any longer, so I went to London.

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I wanted to be a doctor. In London I studied medicine with a famous doctor, Mr James Bates. While I was studying I worked for him, too, so my father did not have to pay him any money. There was one other thing I wanted to do very much. I hoped to travel, and visit foreign lands some day.

I loved reading. Of course, I liked to read about being a doctor. But I also read about science, mathematics, and engineering, which means knowing how to build machines. Best of all, I liked reading about foreign countries, and the way people lived in other lands. When I had enough money, I bought books. But Dr Bates did not pay me much, so I could not buy many!

After four years I went home to see my family. I had a pleasant surprise. My father and my uncle gave me forty pounds. Also they promised to send me thirty pounds each year while I learnt more about medicine. That does not seem to be much money these days, but in those days it was a lot.

So, at last, I had enough money to do what I wanted. I left Dr Bates and went to study at Leyden in Holland for two years. I still wanted to travel, so I learnt many things which I could use on long sea-journeys, or 'voyages' as they are called.

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#### My first voyages

After I finished studying at Leyden I became a ship's doctor. Dr Bates, my old teacher, advised me to take this job. He said it would be very good for me.

For three and a half years I sailed in a ship called the *Swallow*. I went on voyages from England to Turkey and other places. Then I decided to remain on land, in London, for a while. Dr Bates thought this was a good idea. He helped me, too. He sent many people who were ill to me, and I was often very busy.

I rented a house and later I married a young woman called Mary Burton. Her father gave us four hundred pounds as a wedding present. This, I thought, was a very useful present.

After two years my old friend and helper, Dr Bates, died. After that I did not have so much work to do. My wife and friends advised me to travel again.


#### I learn many new things

I sailed several times to Indonesia, which is a very long distance from England. These voyages lasted for six years and I earned a good amount of money. On these journeys I had plenty of time to read many interesting books. Some of them were new, while others had been written a long time before.

When we stopped in a foreign land I watched the people there very carefully. I noticed the special way they dressed and the special things they ate. I found out about their lives at home and at work. I found out about any special laws they had, and about the way their king or governors ruled them. In other words, I studied their 'customs'.

I also tried to learn their languages. My memory is good so I learn new languages easily.

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It was a busy place. All day and every day people worked in the harbour. Most of them put things on to ships, and took things from ships when they arrived. I thought that many seamen and harbour workers would need a doctor. But my luck was not very good. I worked hard for over three years, but I only earned a little money. It was not enough for my family. So I took a good job on another ship, called the *Antelope*. This ship was going to the South Sea Islands, in the Pacific Ocean.

#### A great storm

On 4th May 1699, we sailed from Bristol, a harbour on the south-west coast of England. We sailed west, and then south, into the great Atlantic Ocean. The weather was good all the way until we reach the south of Africa. We turned east, and then the weather changed. A great storm blew us to the north of Australia. This storm lasted a long, long time. Twelve seamen died. They had to work too hard, and because of the storm there was not enough food for them to eat. The rest of us were all very weak.

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
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November was the beginning of summer in that part of the world, but the weather was bad all the time. It was cold, the skies were covered with clouds, and it rained a lot.

After a time I felt something on my left leg. It was alive and it moved very gently over my body towards my chin. I tried to look down as far as I could.

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#### The little people shoot arrows at me



More than a hundred men climbed up the ladders. They carried baskets of meat. The meat in each basket came from a different animal. I did not know the names of these animals at all. There were many different


shapes but each piece was smaller than the wings of a little bird.
