由教育部考试中心设计、开发的全国公共英语等级考试体系 (Public English Test System,简称 PETS)是面向全社会开放型考 试体系。该体系不受年龄、职业和学历的限制,考生可视自身情况 择级自由报考。该项考试已开始在北京、上海、天津、河北、山东、 福建、江苏、安徽、浙江、湖北、河南、广东、辽宁、吉林、海南 15 个省 市推广。它覆盖不同层次考生的需求,共分五级。各级考试均为 目标参照性考试,根据不同需要设置了考查听、说、读、写各种能力 的题型,以全面测试出考生在相应级别的英语交际能力。我们深 信随着社会主义市场经济体制的建立与完善, PETS 会不断得到 社会的认可,逐渐取代我国现存的、互不关联的一些英语考试。据 悉,该考试体系中一级略高于初中毕业生的英语水平;二级相当于 普通高中优秀毕业生的水平;三级相当于在大专院校学习两年公 共英语或自学了同等程度英语课程的水平;四级相当于在大学学 习了三至四年或自学了同等程度英语课程的水平; 五级相当于大 学英语专业二年级结束时的水平。目前,有些省市认定二级考试 的成绩可替代自学考试非英语专业专科的英语成绩;三级可替代 自学考试非英语专业本科的英语成绩;五级可替代申请公费出国 留学的 EPT 成绩。

为了使更多的考生顺利通过相应级别的考试,我们特聘请了从事中学、大学教学有经验的英语特级教师、讲师、副教授、教授共同合作编写了这套 PETS 1~5 级模拟题集。目的旨在让广大考生熟悉各级目标性测试试卷的结构、题型的分布以及题项的难易度,从自测的角度了解自己的英语水平,并通过不断实践提高实际运用英语语言的能力。

本套模拟题集由王秀珍教授担任总主编,中级英语教师余茂生(其业绩被收入中国人事部《中国专家大辞典》)、高级英语教师张宏敏、程维华副教授、冉小群副教授、汪火焰副教授分别担任第一级至第五级模拟题集的主编。另外还聘请了一批教学经验丰富、科研能力强且具有合作精神的中青年教师参与编写。因此,这套题集是一项共同合作而成的研究成果。它具有针对性强的特点,我们相信它会受到广大读者的欢迎和关注。此套模拟题集还配有音质纯正、语速适中的磁带。

在编写这套模拟题集之前,武汉大学出版社王春阁副编审进行了认真的市场行情的调查,积极筹备编写事宜,并协同其他编辑为此套书的出版作了大量的工作,在此表示衷心的感谢!

Text 1

Tall and silver-haired, with softly reassuring blue eyes, Dr. Patrick Christopher Steptoe looked very kind. In fact, he was a medical revolutionary. On July 25, 1978, as hundreds of reporters gathered on the sleepy English mill town of Oldham, the 65-year-old obstetrician delivered the world's first "test-tube baby", a healthy, 5-lb. 12-oz. girl fitly named Louise Joy Brown. Conceived in a lab dish, from the egg and sperm of a working class couple who had tried for years to have a child, she seemed rather miraculous.

The astonishing performance brought instant celebrity to Steptoe and his partner, Robert Edwards — as well as a lot of criticism. The Roman Catholic Church and other religious groups denounced it as playing God. But the debate faded as it became clear that the brave new world of baby-making that Steptoe has ushered in was providing a desperately sought service.

Today such artificially assisted pregnancies are commonplace (an estimated 300 000 have taken place in the past 20 years).

Steptoe, who witnessed many of these changes before his death at 74, in 1988, was an unlikely revolutionary. Born to a church organist father and social-service worker mother in rural Oxfordshire, he decided at an early age to pursue medicine over music. During World War II, he was captured by the Italians after his ship was sunk and got himself shut into solitary for helping other prisoners escape. Setting up a practice in obstetrics and gynecology after the war, he pioneered some new surgery devices. In 1966, to help women with blocked fallopian tubes, a major cause of infertility, he

teamed up with Edwards, a Cambridge physiologist who had developed a way to fertilize human eggs in the lab.

Edwards had worked only with eggs obtained from ovaries removed from medical reasons. Steptoe managed to siphon eggs directly from infertile women. If the eggs were retrieved at just the right time and then fertilized in vitro, they could be transferred into the uterus.

For more than a decade, Steptoe and Edwards performed dozens of in vitro experiments — paid for in part by Steptoe's earnings from legal abortions — but none of the 30 or so pregnancies lasted more than 10 weeks. Finally, the pair decided that instead of waiting four or more days, they would implant it after just two and a half days. Their daring strategy worked — and just short of nine months later, while all the world seemed to be watching, Steptoe delivered Baby Brown by caesarean section(剖腹产术).
