前言

上海市教委本着培养创新人才,鼓励优等学生成才以及在大学本科新生中引入适当的竞争机制的目的,每年举行一次插班生考试。最初的考试规模不是很大且录取人数也比较少,但是自 2000 年上海市教委先后允许复旦大学、上海交通大学、同济大学、华东师范大学、华东理工大学、华东政法大学、上海大学、东华大学、上海理工大学、上海海洋大学、上海工程技术大学、上海海事大学、上海政法学院等 13 所高校招收插班生,其每年的录取人数也在快速增加,已达近 500 人,其考试规模的扩大速度更是惊人,每年已有大约6 000多考生参加此考试,竞争日趋激烈。

由于该考试属于非上海市统一命题,是由各个院校自主命题,其考试的难易程度也存在一定的差异。但通过对各院校历年英语考试试卷的分析,我们发现大部分院校的试卷难度都介于大学英语四、六级之间,有部分院校的试卷难度要达到大学英语六级以上。鉴于此种情况,为了帮助考生在考试中取得优异成绩,我们根据多年的辅导教学经验和此考试的特点,经过多年的努力,我们编辑出版了"上海市插班生英语考试词汇训练"一书,共分基础篇和提高篇两部分,供考生在复习应考中学习。本书共收录了4000多常考词汇,并附有详细的解释说明。我们相信,如果考生能熟悉掌握这些词汇的使用,在该考试中定能取得理想的成绩。
