六座拿破仑半身像

一天, 苏格兰场的雷斯垂德先生到福尔摩斯家拜访。 他向福尔摩斯和华生介绍了一起十分离奇的案件: 四天内 先后有三座拿破仑的半身石膏像在不同的地点被人看似毫 无目的的打碎, 之后作案人便逃之夭夭。福尔摩斯对此很 感兴趣。

第二天清晨,又有一座拿破仑半身像在一位记者家中被人打碎,并且有一个人被杀害在碎片的现场。福尔摩斯和华生闻讯而来,在听了介绍和查看了现场之后,福尔摩斯带走了破案的一个重要线索——从死者身上搜出来的一张照片。

福尔摩斯和形影不离的华生先后去卖半身像的哈定兄弟商店和被打破塑像的贺得逊商店打听情况,得知照片上的人是一个名叫倍波的意大利工匠。

福尔摩斯他们又顺藤摸瓜,在生产塑像的盖尔得尔公

司里查到了拿破仑半身像的生产来历和销售去向,又从经 理口中得知倍波一年前曾因故意伤人在工场内被捕,最近 才被释放。

晚上,福尔摩斯和警官雷斯垂德在第五座拿破仑半身像所在的齐兹威克区一位先生家附近守候,终于将前来盗窃塑像的倍波抓获。

第二天晚上,在福尔摩斯家中,随着第六座拿破仑半身像的打破,一颗珍珠展现在大家的面前。福尔摩斯通过查找报纸总结归纳,向雷斯垂德警官和华生揭开了这个案件的前因后果:原来一年前,倍波辗转得到了这颗宫廷失窃的珠宝,当时他因为伤了人正面临被逮捕,情急之下他便将其藏于工场内六座拿破仑半身像其中之一的里面。出狱后的他便四处寻找这些塑像,将之逐个打碎来寻找其中的珍珠宝石,并在记者家中杀死了尾随跟踪他的知情人。

It was no very unusual thing for Mr. Lestrade, of Scotland Yard, to look in upon us of an evening, and his visits were welcome to Sherlock Holmes, for they enabled him to keep in touch with all that was going on at the police head-quarters. In return for the news which Lestrade would bring, Holmes was always ready to listen with attention to the details of any case upon which the detective was engaged, and was able occasionally[®], without any active interference, to give some hint[®] or suggestion drawn from his own vast[®] knowledge and experience.

On the other hand, although it is trivial, it is undoubtedly queer[®], and I know that you have a taste for all that is out of the common. But, in my opinion, it comes more in Dr. Watson 's line than ours."

Holmes sank back in his chair.

"That's no business of mine," said he.

"Exactly. That's what I said. But then, when the man commits burglary in order to break images which are not his own, that brings it away from the doctor and on to the policeman."

Holmes sat up again.

"Burglary! This is more interesting. Let me hear the details."

Lestrade took out his official note-book and refreshed[®] his memory from its pages.

"It was at the shop of Morse Hudson, who has a place for the sale of pictures and statues in the Kennington Road. He rushed out into the road, but, although several passers-by declared that they had noticed a man run out of the shop, he could neither see anyone nor could he find any means of identifying³ the rascal⁴. It seemed to be one of those senseless acts of Hooliganism which occur from time to time, and it was reported to the constable on the beat as such. The plaster cast was not worth more than a few shillings, and the whole affair appeared to be too childish for

any particular investigation^①.

"The second case, however, was more serious and also more singular. It occurred only last night.

"In Kennington Road, and within a few hundred yards of Morse Hudson's shop, there lives a well-known medical practitioner[®], named Dr. Barnicot, who has one of the largest practices upon the south side of the Thames. His residence[®] and principal consulting-room is at Kennington Road, but he has a branch surgery and dispensary[®] at Lower Brixton Road, two miles away. This Dr. Barnicot is an enthusiastic[®] admirer of Napoleon, and his house is full of books, pictures, and relics[®] of the French Emperor. Some little time ago he purchased from Morse Hudson two duplicate plaster casts of the famous head of Napoleon by the French sculptor[®], Devine. One of these he placed in his

hall in the house at Kennington Road, and the other on the mantelpiece[®] of the surgery at Lower Brixton. Well, when Dr. Barnicot came down this morning he was astonished[®] to find that his house had been burgled[®] during the night, but that nothing had been taken save the plaster head from the hall. It had been carried out and had been dashed savagely[®] against the garden wall, under which its splintered[®] fragments were discovered."

Holmes rubbed his hands. "This is certainly very novel," said he.

"I thought it would please you. But I have not got to the end yet. Dr. Barnicot was due at his surgery at twelve o'clock, and you can imagine his amazement[®] when, on arriving there, he found that the window had been opened in the night, and that the broken pieces of his second bust

"They are singular, not to say grotesque[®]," said Holmes. "May I ask whether the two busts smashed in Dr. Barnicot's rooms were the exact duplicates of the one which was destroyed in Morse Hudson's shop?"

"They were taken from the same mould."

"Such a fact must tell against the theory that the man who breaks them is influenced[®] by any general hatred[®] of

Napoleon. Considering how many hundreds of statues of the great Emperor must exist in London, it is too much to suppose such a coincidence as that a promiscuous^① iconoclast^② should chance to begin upon three specimens of the same bust."

"Well, I thought as you do," said Lestrade. "On the other hand, this Morse Hudson is the purveyor of busts in that part of London, and these three were the only ones which had been in his shop for years. So, although, as you say, there are many hundreds of statues in London, it is very probable that these three were the only ones in that district. Therefore, a local fanatic would begin with them. What do you think, Dr. Watson?"

"There are no limits to the possibilities of monomania[®]," I answered. "There is the condition which the modern French psychologists have called the 'idee fixe', which may be

trifling in character, and accompanied by complete sanity in every other way. A man who had read deeply about Napoleon, or who had possibly received some hereditary¹⁰ family injury through the great war, might conceivably²⁰ form such an 'idee fixe' and under its influence be capable of any fantastic outrage."

"That won't do, my dear Watson," said Holmes, shaking his head, "for no amount of 'idee fixe' would enable your interesting monomaniac³ to find out where these busts were situated."

"Well, how do you explain it?"

"I don't attempt to do so. I would only observe that there is a certain method in the gentleman's eccentric proceedings. For example, in Dr. Barnicot's hall, where a sound might arouse the family, the bust was taken outside before being broken, whereas in the surgery, where
