Using the Dictionary

- The Longman Pocket English Dictionary is the ideal handy dictionary for intermediate students of English.
 - The meanings of over 16 000 words and phrases are explained clearly and simply using the Longman Defining Vocabulary of just 2000 English words. Any additional words, that you may not know, are written in SMALL CAPITAL LETTERS. These additional words are explained in their own alphabetical position. Example sentences and phrases, based on real sentences and phrases in books and newspapers, show how the words are used in natural, everyday English.
- Special language notes explain how to use some of the most important English words without making mistakes. The Longman Pocket Dictionary also helps with grammar points such as irregular verbs and adjectives, and with prepositions showing which preposition links the word with the following word or words: for example, Are you afraid of the dark?
- Sometimes words with the same spelling are different in meaning, grammar, or pronunciation. These words are explained in separate entries. For example: love¹ is a verb and love² is a noun; row¹ means a line, row² means a quarrel.
- You sometimes want to know about other words you could use instead of the one you are looking at, or to find out which words mean the opposite. The Longman Pocket Dictionary gives you this information too. Where these words are useful, they are listed at the end of an entry. The dictionary also has 15 pages of colour pictures showing words connected with common, everyday situations.
- By giving you the basic building blocks to work with, the Longman Pocket Dictionary helps you to build up your word power, so that you can produce English sentences which are not only accurate but also sound natural.

acronym /'ækrənim/ noun a word that is made from the first letters of a group of words. For example, TEFL is an acronym for Teaching English as a Foreign Language
