Foreword

A Chinese herb medicine, the fruiting body of Lingzhi, Ganoderma lucidum, has been used as a folk remedy in China for thousands of years, as reported in Shenong Materia Medica. Increasing research in the modern times elucidates numerous pharmacological effects of Lingzhi, including immunomodulating and anti-tumor, anti-atherosclerosis, lipid-lowering, hypoglycemic, liver-protective, anti-oxidative, free radical scavenging and anti-aging activities. Recent clinical studies in China also prove that Lingzhi can be used to treat bronchitis, arteriosclerosis, neurasthenia and insomnia, hepatitis, diabetes, cancers and aging.

Nowadays, both in China and abroad, extensive research and in dustrial development has lead Lingzhi and a vast variety of its products to be widely applied for the prevention and cure of diseases, as well as for the improvement of health and general well-being. However, along with the commercialization, quality of and advertisement for the products has become a concern. The product quality varies greatly, and the claims on the efficacy and functions are frequently untrue, or exaggerated to say the least. To confront such

undesirable outcomes, perhaps, the best way is to provide consumers with the scientific information on Lingzhi in plain and easily understandable language.

With that, the idea of writing a popular science book on Lingzhi was born. In preparation, I reviewed volumes of available promotional materials on Lingzhi. Indeed, I discovered that while the commercial literature full of misleading descriptions, the popular science publications were largely lacking rigorous scientific evidence. A year ago, the book, *Lingzhi: From Mystery to Science*, in Chinese was published. To reach a wider readership, this English version has been translated from the Chinese edition. In particular, some of the clinical trials were conducted in the past under very different circumstances from today. The in vitro tests can hardly be duplicated nowadays. Consequently, the existing information is invaluable for anyone who is interested in the study of Lingzhi. Most of the clinical reports were written in Chinese when they first appeared. Through this publication, it is hoped that researchers and consumers worldwide may benefit.

In the book, original reports on the systematic clinical studies, rather than individual cases, relating to Lingzhi's medicinal efficacy are presented for the discussion. In Chapters 3, 14 and 15 comprehensive information is presented on Lingzhi product's quality, usage and processing technologies. During my decades of research on Lingzhi, I have become deeply interested in the ancient Chinese literature, traditional culture and the philosophy associated with Lingzhi. Lingzhi's spiritual and mystical image is ingrained and permeated in the people, culture and tradition. It comes with its graceful appearance and magic efficacy. Thus, in Chapter 1 and 2, the historical legends

and evidence, which has evolved into Lingzhi's symbolic meaning of happiness and longevity, are briefed to reflect my earnest hope for the health and well-being of all.

This book refers much of its scientific research results from what is in *Modern Research of Ganoderma lucidum, 3rd Edition* (by Zhi-Bin Lin, Peking University Medical Press, Beijing, 2007). For the detailed information, therefore, readers are advised to refer to that publication. Other references that are directly cited are listed immediately following the text in this book.
