这一句是前文 the younger one 的同位语,用来进一步说明是哪一位。who 引出一个定语从句,修饰 the one。who 从句中又出现 the same ... 这个句型。在这一句型中,as 是关系代词,用来引导关系从句,和 the same 搭配使用。如:I have the same trouble as you (have)。我和你有同样的困难。

上句省略了 have。同样,课文中的句子也省略了动词 work, 其逻辑上的完整形式 应是 as my husband works。
