

## 出版前言

《剑桥文学指南》是上海外语教育出版社从海外引进的一套研究、介绍外国文学的丛书,内容涉及作家、作品、文学流派、文学史等诸多方面。作者均为在该领域有着较深造诣的专家、学者。

本书由美国著名学者 Donald Pizer 教授主编,汇集了 11 篇视角新颖的评论文章,旨在对美国现实主义和自然主义进行全面的介绍和研究。全书共分三个部分: 第一部分为历史背景的研究; 第二部分为20世纪70年代以来对该流派的批评方法的研究; 第三部分为作品研究, 涉及到豪威尔斯、亨利·詹姆斯、马克·吐温、西奥多·德莱塞、厄普敦·舍克莱、杰克·伦敦等 10 多位作家及其作品。本书还附有自 1865 至 1914 年的大事年表, 按年代记录了这一时期发生的政治、经济及文学上的重大事件,对于我们深入研究美国文学无疑具有很大的价值。

本书的读者对象为大学外语教师,外国文学研究人员,外国文学专业的研究生、博士生,以及具备了较高英语阅读能力的外国文学爱好者。
