Unit One

Planning your trip

- People are always telling us that "getting there is half the fun." But is it true? Is it always true? Of course, we can all remember many enjoyable trips we have taken. But haven't we all taken a trip that wasn't fun at all? Can we ever forget the time when we just wanted to come home?
- 2 Of course, you answer, but that's understandable. Not all trips are holidays. For example, when people travel on business, they don't have the time or the peace of mind to enjoy themselves. But when people take a vacation, they always have fun. Right?
- Wrong. The fact is, some people who travel for pleasure get no pleasure from it at all. Others, who travel because they must travel, have a lot of fun doing it. What makes one trip more enjoyable than another?
- 4 The answer is planning. Any trip can be enjoyable if it is well planned. Every minute that you spend planning your trip may save you ten minutes of trouble during your trip. It may also add an hour of pleasure!

Money

- Before you take any trip, the first question to ask yourself is: How much can I spend? When you decide on a figure, write it down. Now you can decide where, when, and how to go. At home, you can find out what it costs to travel anywhere in the world. Just pick up the phone and call a travel agent.
- With the help of a travel agent, you can make out a daily budget for your trip. List everything that you will have to spend money on. Try not to forget anything. Once you have made yourself a budget, use it. Don't spend more one day, and then plan to spend less the next day. You may find yourself without any money before the trip is over.
- If you are traveling to foreign countries, you may want to carry your money in traveler's checks instead of cash. The nice thing about traveler's checks is that if they are stolen or lost, you can get your money back. You just give your check numbers to the bank or company which sold them to you. Be sure to write the check numbers down and keep the list in a safe place.
- 8 Try not to exchange your traveler's checks at the airport, or at hotels and restaurants. Banks in the city will usually offer a better price.

In Season, Off Season

- 9 Many resorts and cities around the world are popular during some months of the year and less popular during other months. Find out if the places you are visiting have an "in" season and an "off" season. This may help you to decide when you want to go.
- There are some very good reasons to travel during the off-season. Usually everything is much cheaper. It is also less crowded, of course. If you don't have a lot of money—or if you don't like crowds of tourists—go in the off-season.
- Some places are not as exciting during the offseason. The weather may be too cold or too hot. The beaches may be closed. Hotels and restaurants may be shut. Be sure to find out before you go.

Jet Travel

- Traveling by jet is fast and comfortable, but it is not without its problems. It is possible to spend six hours on a plane and arrive at the same hour that you left. The clock inside you is telling you that it is bedtime. But the clock on the wall is saying that it is time for lunch.
- This is what people call "jet lag." It is the sleepy feeling you get for a few days after a long airplane trip. To feel as little jet lag as possible, get a lot of sleep before your flight. Don't eat or drink too much on the plane. And once you are there, get a lot of rest during the first few days.

Car Travel

If you are traveling by car, it is a good idea to join the auto club. Most countries have clubs to help drivers plan and enjoy their trips. For example, the *Touring Club de France* has been around for over fifty years. It is inexpensive to join. It will give you all the maps you need. It will also give you lists of the garages, hotels, and restaurants along the way.

Passports

- 15 There was a time when a person could decide to leave the country on Monday and get on a boat on Tuesday. Now everyone must have a passport to go abroad.
- It is not hard to get a passport, but you should ask for one a few months before you begin your journey. To get one, you must have your birth certificate or another legal document to prove that you are a citizen. You will probably also need to bring a few photographs of yourself and some money. For more information call or write the passport office.

Visas, Health Certificates

Sometimes you need a visa to visit a country. If a visa is necessary, you can ask for one at the country's embassy. Sometimes getting a visa takes many months, so it is very important to plan early. The same is true for health certificates. For this information it is a good idea to call or write the embassies. You may also get a lot of other useful information from them.

What to Pack

- "When in doubt, leave it out!" That is the first rule to follow while you are packing for your trip. Take as little as possible. At the same time, make sure that your suitcases are not too small for the clothes you are bringing. There is nothing worse than breaking a suitcase during a trip.
- 19 Things you must take:
 - A raincoat. It is the most useful kind of coat to take.
 - A sweater. Even in hot places, it sometimes gets cold in the evenings.
 - A second pair of glasses, if you wear glasses.
 - A dictionary. You'll learn the language a lot faster.
 - Good books to read. You will often find yourself with nothing to do but read.
 - And most important, a comfortable pair of walking shoes. You may not plan to do too much walking. But believe me, you will do a lot of it.
- If you are traveling with children, make sure they are in good health. Also it is important to plan to give them meals at their usual times. Another good idea is to plan something every day that the children will be sure to like.
- Well, now that you have planned your trip, you are ready to take it. Should you expect any surprises? Of course you should. Let's just hope they're pleasant ones!
