Editor's Foreword

I f language can be considered a fabric, then the warp are its words, the weft its grammar. There are plain-weave fabrics with little color and elaborate tapestries that are works of art. Much of literary language falls into the latter category. Yet we cannot ignore the poetry and the rhetorical devices used by those of us who are not poets. Language is by nature metaphoric.

With a few exceptions, dictionaries persist in ignoring the most productive, evocative, emotive, descriptive aspects of language. They pay scant attention to the creative genius of its users, whether they be poets or peasants. Rather, they are concerned with a sterile distillate which robs the lexicon of its intimations of creativity. Lexicographers by tradition or discipline ignore the innate ability of speakers to perceive relationships between the realities of life and the symbolism of myth, literature, culture, and language. The rationale is that dictionaries record denotation, not connotation. Even cursory examination of any desk (or larger) dictionary will show that such a claim is errant, arrant nonsense: one need only read through a few longer entries like *take*, *run*, or *set* to see how false that position is, how many metaphoric senses are listed.

Lexicographers, it must be acknowledged, are (almost) human, too: no matter how disciplined the mind, it cannot avoid metaphor or allusion. Language is not a plain weave, an ecru fustian; it is a colorful tapestry. Depending on the weaver, it may not always turn out to be a panoramic work of art, but colorful it often is, frequently realistic in some areas and abstract in others. Even the "scientific" lexicographer succumbs to its magic, unable to separate his work from his nature: there can be no objectivity in the description of one's own language.

Nevertheless, that does not keep lexicographers from trying to be objective, chiefly by the arbitrary elimination of certain classes of words and meanings and the inclusion—just as arbitrary—of others. We may ask why, for example, the word *Superman* (in reference to the comic-strip character) is omitted: surely, it has not only denotative meaning but also a host of useful connotations and metaphoric senses that are far more familiar to (American) English speakers than are the kinds of obscure entries that one customarily finds in dictionaries.

There are thousands of such references that constantly occur in our language. Some may be drawn from the comic strips, as in the case of Superman; many are drawn from literature (Babbitt, Scrooge), from legend or mythology (Midas, Hercules, Paul Bunyan), from brand names (Edsel, Coca-Cola [Coke]), from symbols (closed book, yin-yang), from real people (Shake-speare, Rockefeller—on a formula like, "He's a regular Rockefeller"), from events (Watergate, Boston Tea Party), from the names of places, buildings, or the like (Loch Ness, Empire State Building), from music and the other arts (Star-spangled Banner, Mona Lisa), from animals (dolphin, leopard, mule, rabbit—all

have their attributes), and from every other classification of information associated with culture. By what criteria may such references be omitted from a dictionary that purports to contain "all of the common words and meanings of English"? Even so-called "unabridged" dictionaries don't list them.

These lexical items cannot be omitted on the grounds of lack of frequency: they are often more frequent than words that are listed. They cannot be omitted because "everyone already knows them": a (general) dictionary is supposed to be "a description of the lexicon, or word stock of a language," and they clearly are a part of the lexicon. Many words, now spelled with small letters, were once allusive referents—thersitical, pander. Some are listed in dictionaries with capitals—Midas, Jonah, Adam, Gargantuan. Capitalization is an empty criterion if we consider language as primarily spoken, with any distinction between capital and small letters obviously inaudible. (It may be true that some proper names and adjectives are identifiable from their syntactic relationships, even in oral discourse, but that is not true of all: we speak of Shakespeare, "the" George Washington Bridge, and so on; but how can one analyze a Shakespeare 'a genius,' or a Scrooge 'a miser,' or a Rockefeller 'a wealthy man' as distinct from the senses for which they are equivalents? These are preceded by indefinite articles, hence are used metaphorically.)

Because we feel these words should be documented in their metaphoric senses, we have compiled this book. Allusions-Cultural, Literary, Biblical, and Historical: A Thematic Dictionary, contains more than 7000 such references: to the Bible, Shakespeare, Dickens; to Greek, Roman, Scandinavian, and other mythologies; to American, European, Eastern, and other legends; to music, the arts, industry, comics, motion pictures, television, radio-in fact, to all of the divers elements that make up what we classify under the general rubric of culture. These are our familiar, everyday references, the things we talk about and the things we use when we speak English, the veritable fabric of our lives, gathered in a single work for easy reference. Not everything is here, of course. There are probably hundreds of thousands of allusions (if they could all be counted), always arriving, always departing. Any reader of this book can find inclusions that may not be to his taste and omissions that he considers heinously unforgivable. We have attempted a broad coverage of a subject so vast and so mercurial that it is doubtful its documentation can ever be complete. We should be grateful for readers' comments, addenda, and corrigenda.

How To Use This Book

Allusions consists of three parts:

1. The main section, containing 628 thematic categories with more than 7000 references listed under them.

The thematic categories are listed in alphabetical order and are numbered consecutively. Under each category are listed, also in alphabetical order and also numbered consecutively, a number of allusions. If you are seeking a set of allusions dealing with, say, **IRASCIBILITY**, then you need only find that thematic category and the allusions will be listed below it:

346. IRASCIBILITY (See also ANGER, EXASPERATION, SHREW-ISHNESS.)

- I. Caius, Dr. irritable physician. [Br. Lit.: Merry Wives of Windsor]
- 2. **Donald Duck** cantankerousness itself. [Comics: Horn, 216–217]
- 3. Elisha sics bears on boys for their jibing. [O.T.: II Kings 2:23-24]
- 4. Findlay, Maude out-spoken, oft-married, liberated woman. [TV: "Maude" in Terrace, II, 79–80]

Note that the bracketed text included with each entry contains several useful pieces of information:

(a) A broad category that gives the allusive reference some focus (e.g., "Br. Lit." for 1, "Comics" for 2, "O.T." for 3, and "TV" for 4).

Note: For the sake of brevity, broad categories are not repeated in the identification of the allusion itself. A list of abbreviations appears on the next page.

- (b) The title of a primary source, shown in italic type (e.g., "Merry Wives of Windsor" for 1, "II Kings" for 3).
- (c) The title of a secondary source, shown, in some cases, in a shortened form (e.g., "Horn" for 2, "Terrace, II" for 4).
- (d) The page number or other localized reference where a particular citation can be found (e.g., "Horn, 216–217" for 2, "II Kings 2:23–24" for 3, "Terrace, II, 79–80" for 4).

Note: Except for references to the Bible, few localized references are provided in primary sources because the person or place used allusively often appears throughout the work.

(e) Most real people referred to are listed with their birth (and, where appropriate, death) dates (e.g., "Henry, Patrick (1736–1799)"). In some cases, where such a date is absent, look up the person in the Index to find another reference, where the date will appear. In rare cases, it has not been possible to determine an individual's dates.

- 2. The Bibliography contains the lists of sources consulted in the preparation of this book. These sources are listed in alphabetical order by the short reference or code that appears in square brackets following each listing in the main section. The editions referred to, for the sake of accuracy, are those used in the compilation of *Allusions*, but in a large number of cases, there may be many editions of the work cited, and it makes little difference which edition is consulted if you wish to refer to the actual source.
- 3. The third section consists of an Index in which can be found, in single alphabetical file, not only all of the allusions listed in the main body of the work but many cross references and variant forms. For example, the listing flaming heart will appear also (in its proper alphabetical place) as heart, flaming, with an appropriate numerical reference that will guide you to the thematic category and then to the numbered subentry following it. Thus, the reference 598.9 refers to thematic category 598 [598. Villainy (See also Evil, Wickedness.)] and to the fourth listing beneath it (9. Iago).

To aid in the search for these numbered items, each page in the main part of the book carries a heading, at the indicating the numerical interval appearing on that page.

If you wish to find an allusion to use in a speech or in writing, find the proper thematic category and choose from among the allusions listed there. Because the description provided for identification is, necessarily, brief, you may wish to have fuller information about the allusion, in order to make certain, for instance, that your selection has the correct nuances and connotations. You may then wish to turn to the Bibliography, find the source, and read more about the subject in the book itself.

On the other hand, in your reading you may encounter an allusion whose reference you are unsure of. In that case, you will be guided to the entry itself and to its reference in the Bibliography
