

The vocabulary and structures used in this book are at Level 4 of Collins English Library. These are listed in detail in A Guide to Collins English Library.

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To the learner

This book has similar tests to those in Book 3. They are at a more difficult stage of English study, but you should be able to answer the questions as well as before.

In each test there are three Sections, A, B and C. The sentences in Section A are a test of your writing or speaking ability; you have to choose the word(s) to complete each sentence correctly. Section B uses complete sentences too; your job here is to choose the right meaning. Section C of each test is now a little different; this is what you have to do. First read the whole story in order to get some idea of the meaning; then think of the best word to go in each space. Each space must have only *one* word in it.

Write your answers to each of the questions. Make sure that you give each answer its correct number. In Sections A and B there is only one correct answer to each question; Section C may have more than one answer to each missing word. Give the letter of the correct answer – A, B, C or D – or write the correct word.

Time You should be able to do each test in about 45 minutes.

Section A – 20 minutes. Take one minute for each question.

Section B – 15 minutes. Take up to three minutes for each question.
