

INTRODUCTION

And so it is with poisonous quotes—a little bit of praise may go a long way, but insults go on forever.

This Book of Poisonous Quotes has thousands of choice cutting criticisms and willfully wicked witticisms to choose from. Nobody is safe from these stinging salvos—pillars of society are pilloried, authors written off, sports stars run down, celebrities defamed, financiers discredited, and actors hamstrung.

My propensity for things poisonous started back in 1987, when I was told by a sports editor that I could not call the (yet-to-be-disgraced) Canadian athlete Ben Johnson a "human cheetah." Ever since that letdown over a put-down I have been in search of my personal Holy Grail—the perfect (or perfectly acceptable) insult. Six years of research have led me to believe that the perfect put-down has not yet been uttered—but there has never been a shortage of people who have tried to discover the aqua regia of acrimony. A year's

research in the United States left me with the impression that the American Uncivil War was still being fought—between commentator and politician, critic and artist, reviewer and author.

In their traditional evening-wear battle dress and fueled by a proud motto ("The pen is mightier than the sword"), the critical snide snipers have always had their sights firmly set on their favorite targets—be it a Nixon, a Streisand, or a Whitman.

This war of the words is not a one-sided combat zone. Critics with bitchy trigger fingers may draw first blood, but they are not sheltered from hostile fire being returned. Reviewers may go over the top from the comfort of their own writing desks, but the likes (or dislikes) of Rich, Simon, Mencken, and Woollcott are constantly shelled with the repercussions of their own critical fallout.

HOW TO USE THIS BOOK

The Book of Poisonous Quotes has been compiled to be used as either reading or reference material.

The table of contents lists the subsections within the major categories.

Within the sections, the quotations are listed alphabetically by individual subject or, if there is no individual subject, by source. Within each subsection, the quotations are listed alphabetically by source.

The index contains the names of the subjects of the quotations as well as the names of the people quoted.

Biographical details include birth and death dates, if known. This information is given to place the quotes in a time context rather than in the interests of providing a definitive biographical reference.

Sections containing reviews are alphabetically listed in two fashions—either by reviewer or by subject as indicated in the table of contents.
