ACADEMIC ORGANISATION

UWIST has 15 academic departments: Applied Biology, Applied Chemistry, Applied Psychology, Welsh School of Architecture, Business and Economics, Civil Engineering and Building Technology, English, Law, Maritime Studies, Mathematics, Mechanical and Manufacturing Systems Engineering, Optometry, Welsh School of Pharmacy, Physics, Electronics and Electrical Engineering, Town Planning.

London, one of the world's most famous universities, is made up of a total of 50 colleges, nearly all of which are sited in and around the centre of the city. Of the six largest colleges, only one, Royal Holloway and Bedford New College, is situated outside London, occupying a 100 acre campus at Egham Hill, a few hundred metres from Windsor Great Park. The RHBNC campus allows students to live and work in the peace of the Surrey countryside while being only 30 minutes by train from the attractions of one of the great capital cities.

THE CAMPUS

Students from overseas will be in hall for at least two of their three years at the College.

As you would expect in a college of one of the world's great universities, academic standards are extremely high and much is expected of our students. The essential teaching methods of lectures and practical work are backed up by a long established tutorial system which ensures that students are given every help to achieve these high standards.

FOREWORD

British universities, polytechnics and colleges welcome qualified applicants from overseas. There is a wide diversity of courses and of institutions in the United Kingdom to meet the varying interests and expectations of the great majority of students. The distinctive and unifying feature of the system is its insistence on consistently high standards for each level of course. These standards are maintained by careful and continuous processes of professional and academic co-operation between institutions, to ensure that courses are well planned, taught and examined, and that the resulting qualifications will be recognised, both in the UK and abroad, as evidence of achievement and excellence.

At the individual level, students are carefully selected before they are accepted on courses of higher education. Often they are trained in small groups and enjoy regular and personal contact with teaching staff of a high calibre. The staff to student ratio is one of the lowest in the world. The proportion of Nobel prize winners, some of them originally from overseas, is one of the highest in the world. Many institutions of higher education in the UK are smaller and less impersonal than those in other countries and a student here can enjoy the friendly and lively atmosphere of a community of students, teachers and researchers.

This intensive study, supported by individual attention in a stimulating environment, leads to a very high rate of success in a shorter time than is common in many other countries. In the UK there is a much closer correspondence than elsewhere between numbers of students accepted and numbers of students who graduate. Once accepted on a course, you are very likely to succeed if you are willing to work. Because many first degree courses last only three years, you might well find that the total costs (academic fees and living costs combined) of your stay in the UK will compare favourably with the total costs of studying for a longer period elsewhere.

Many institutions in Britain have a long tradition of welcoming overseas students, and they have experience of providing carefully designed, intensive pre-entry English courses. Living in the UK and studying at an advanced level in English will, of course, give a student the immense advantage of acquiring, in its country of origin, a language used internationally in business, journalism, scholarship and diplomacy. And when you are in the UK, all the rest of Europe is on your doorstep!

THE ASSOCIATION OF COMMONWEALTH UNIVERSITIES

Founded in 1913, the Association is the oldest international inter-university body in the world, and its membership of 300 university institutions includes all the universities in the United Kingdom. Among the activities of the ACU's secretariat in London are various services for students.

Information service

The Association provides factual information about university study and scholarship opportunities. It does this in three ways:

- through publications, such as this handbook; the big 'Commonwealth Universities Yearbook'; directories like 'British Universities' Guide to Graduate Study'; and four awards guides which between them contain almost 650 pages of scholarship information, including many schemes open to candidates in both Commonwealth and non-Commonwealth countries. For details, see the section 'How to Find Out More' in the following pages. ACU publications can be consulted in universities throughout the Commonwealth and in many British Council and other reference libraries
- through a free personal information service for any student who wishes to write to, telephone, or (if in London) call at the ACU office at John Foster House, 36 Gordon Square, London WC1H 0PF. Two student information papers about university study in the UK 'Graduate Study at Universities in Britain' and 'Taking a First Degree at a University in Britain' are available, without charge, if the request is accompanied by two international reply coupons (or, within the UK, by a stamped, addressed, foolscap envelope) for each paper required
- through the ACU reference library, in which anyone able to visit the ACU office during the library's opening hours (available on application) can consult UK university calendars and prospectuses as well as ACU and other guides to courses, awards, etc.

Appointments service

For graduates with superior qualifications who are interested in applying for academic posts in universities in certain Commonwealth countries – notably, but not solely, Australia, New Zealand, Hong Kong and Zimbabwe – this service can provide information about any current vacancies of which it has been notified. It does not operate as a placement or registration service, but it can offer some general guidance on sources of information about academic vacancies in some of the Commonwealth universities that do not normally use the service.

Scholarship schemes

The main scheme administered through the Association is the Commonwealth Scholarship and Fellowship Plan, which enables graduates in any one country of the Commonwealth to study at postgraduate level in another, including, of course, Britain. The secretariat for the British national agency for the Plan, the Commonwealth Scholarship Commission in the United Kingdom, is provided by the ACU – see the section on 'Money Matters' in the following pages.

The Association also provides the secretariat for the Marshall Aid Commemoration Commission, which awards scholarships tenable at universities in Britain by students from the USA.

UNIVERSITY OF LIVERPOOL

THE UNIVERSITY: A CENTURY OF LEARNING

THE UNIVERSITY OF LIVERPOOL is just over a century old, having been founded by the citizens of Liverpool in 1881. The distinctive appearance of the building they erected, the Victoria Building, gave rise to the term 'Redbrick University', which is used to describe Britain's large, well established civic universities. From this one building the University has now expanded into an attractive 34 hectare precinct. Eight Faculties — Science, Engineering, Law, Medicine (including Dentistry and the School of Tropical Medicine), Social and Environmental Studies, Veterinary Science, Education and Extension Studies, and Arts — have a total of over 7,500 full-time students and 850 full-time academic staff. Students studying at Liverpool have access to laboratory facilities, equipment and support services of the highest standard.

UNDERGRADUATE COURSES

The University of Liverpool offers around 160 undergraduate courses in a very wide range of subject areas including courses in most branches of **Science** and **Engineering**, **Business Studies**, **Law**, **Medicine**, **Dentistry**, and **Veterinary Science**. Details of all the courses available are given in the University's Undergraduate Prospectus.

POSTGRADUATE STUDY

The University of Liverpool offers unrivaled facilities for postgraduate work. It offers a very wide range of postgraduate study to well qualified graduates. Facilities for postgraduate research usually leading to the degree of Ph.D. are available in almost all departments of the University where students receive training in research in the most advanced techniques in well equipped laboratories with access to powerful computer facilities. Many departments also offer advanced postgraduate courses which lead to the award of a Master's degree or a Diploma. Over 70 different courses are available. All postgraduate opportunities are given in the University's Postgraduate Prospectus.

THE HIGHER EDUCATION SCENE

In Britain, 'higher education' generally means education beyond the standard of the General Certificate of Education Advanced level examinations.

The 46 *universities* in the United Kingdom are self-governing institutions empowered, usually by Royal Charter, to award degrees. With one exception their funds come mainly from government. The exception is the independent University of Buckingham which is supported by private benefactions and students' fees.

Polytechnics are funded and maintained by local education authorities and the degrees for which they provide courses are awarded by the Council for National Academic Awards, an independent body with its own Royal Charter. There are 30 polytechnics, all in England and Wales. In Scotland there are 16 colleges/institutes called *central institutions*, and these provide most of the advanced full-time courses that are available outside the Scottish universities and colleges of education.

Both universities and polytechnics/central institutions offer courses leading to first degrees, i.e. undergraduate courses to which students can be admitted on the basis of appropriate school-leaving qualifications. Most of these degrees are called bachelor of arts or bachelor of science. Many subjects can be studied at both universities and polytechnics but there are often differences in course structures and teaching methods. Polytechnics in particular provide a wide range of vocationally oriented courses and have a significant commitment to non-degree and part-time studies. Original research, which is traditionally an important function of universities, is also undertaken by the polytechnics, where the emphasis is mainly on 'applied' research.

Colleges and institutes of higher education vary greatly in size and in the range of subjects that they teach. They provide degree courses validated by the Council for National Academic Awards or by a local university, as well as non-degree courses of various kinds.

Some universities and polytechnics have arrangements with nearby colleges for 'bridging courses' in some subjects for overseas students whose qualifications are inappropriate or whose English is not good enough for degree-level work in the United Kingdom. These courses last between one and three years and combine English language tuition and academic study, after which successful students can apply for admission to a degree-level course. In certain cases direct entry to such a bridging programme means that students can begin their studies in Britain on the basis of their own school-leaving qualifications and that formal study for British Advanced level examinations will not be needed.

A master's degree is granted after one or two years of postgraduate study (i.e. study beyond the level of a first degree), which may take the form of taught courses, or of research, or of a combination of courses and research. At a number of institutions, graduates of overseas universities whose degrees may be either too narrowly or too broadly based to fit in with the UK pattern may be admitted to a preliminary year, usually leading to a

certificate or diploma that qualifies them for entry to study for a master's degree.

In many institutions graduates must first register for a master's degree before going on to do research for the degree of doctor of philosophy (PhD or DPhil). Thus students who decide to leave after just one or two years can do so with a recognised qualification, while those who do well and wish to continue their studies can apply to change their registration to PhD/DPhil candidature.

Some institutions are prepared to consider, on an individual basis, applications from overseas graduates who wish to carry out part of their doctoral research in their home country, with suitable local supervision.

There is in Britain no formal, national, system for the 'accreditation' of institutions of higher education; and the power to confer degrees is not restricted by law to particular bodies or institutions. Anyone thinking of studying for a degree offered by an institution or authority in the United Kingdom that is not mentioned in this handbook should first consult the nearest British Council office.

THE ACADEMIC YEAR

At most higher education institutions in Britain the academic year begins in September or October and is divided into three terms. There are however

special arrangements for 'sandwich course' students (see 'Courses Available'); and for some courses, or at certain stages of some courses, the periods of attendance required may not conform to the usual three-term pattern.

University terms usually last for eight to ten weeks each - the first from the beginning of October to mid-December, the second from mid-January to about the end of March, and the third from late April to late June or early July. Two universities - Stirling and (for certain courses) The City - have two 'semesters' a year, starting in September. At the University of Buckingham the academic year begins in January and is divided into four terms of ten weeks each.

The term at polytechnics and other institutions of higher education is usually longer than the university term. Normally the first term runs from about mid-September to mid-December; the second from early January to the end of March; and the third from mid-April to early July.

POST A-LEVEL COURSES

This section describes courses to which students can seek admission on the basis of studies completed up to the standard of the Advanced (A) level examinations of the UK General Certificate of Education (GCE).

First degrees

Undergraduate courses leading to first degrees are provided by universities and by many other institutions of higher education. With certain exceptions mentioned under 'Universities' below, students wishing to obtain a British first degree must come to Britain to follow approved courses and take the relevant examinations.

Universities

The long and varied history of the universities in Britain, and the freedom that each one has to decide what qualifications it will offer, have resulted in a wide variety of degree titles. For example, although most first degrees are
