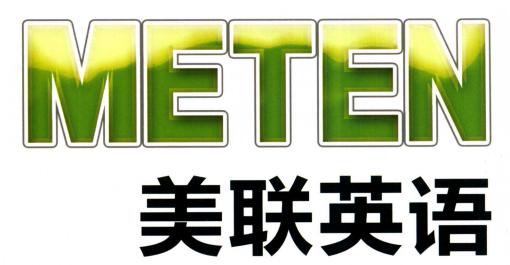
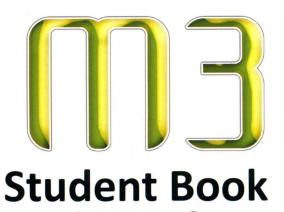

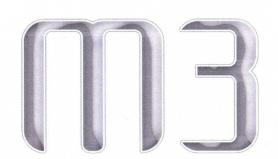

#### 推荐序

"美联通用英语教程"采用了交际教学法,致力于英语综合技能的培养,结合了英语教学工作者丰富的一线教学实践,有以下几大特点:

其次,这套教材的编排体现了话题(topics)、结构(structures)和功能(functions)的紧密结合,强调语言的实际功能运用,也就是用英语听说和做事的能力,符合中国老师和学员的实际需要。话题具有强烈的时代感,具有国际性和跨文化交际性,符合国际化复合人才的培养目标,也符合学员的兴趣需要。

最后,一套好的教材要发挥最大作用还依赖于教师的教学设计和课堂教学组织。这套教材融合了美联英语行之有效的课堂教学设计,模块清晰,把语言技能培养合理地融合到教材模块设计和教学安排之中。美联英语小班课侧重对英语口语技能和语言准确度的训练,而沙龙课的核心是"做中学",鼓励学员积极表达自己的想法,努力将学到的内容应用到日常生活中去,把培养语言技能以及语言应用的准确度和流利度结合起来。
