Unit 1

Higher Education in the United States

There are 3, 500 colleges and universities in the United States. Two year institutions, which are sometimes referred to as community or junior colleges, award the associate degree - Associate of Arts (A. A.) or Associate of Science (A. S.) -following successful completion of a specific two-year, full-time program. The Bachelor of Arts (B. A.) or Bachelor of Science (B. S.) degrees are the two most frequently awarded, but a variety of bachelor's degrees by other names are also granted. Bachelor's degrees are typically awarded following successful completion of a four-year, full-time program. Bachelor's degree programs in some fields of study or at some institutions can be longer than four years.

The graduate degrees offered are the Master's and Ph. D. All degrees include taught courses and research. Class participation, research papers and examinations are important. Degree requirements are stated in terms of "credits" (sometimes called units or hours) and each taught course usually earns 3-4 credits. A student will usually accumulate 24 credits per academic year if the university operates on a traditional two-semester system.

Academic Master's degrees usually require the completion of 30-36 credits and could reasonably be completed in one or two academic year(s). Often a degree will include a thesis option for 6-9 credits. Some institutions are only interested in potential doctoral candidates, although they will usually award a terminal Master's to

students who complete a certain level of course-work but do not go onto their doctoral work.

Professional Master's degrees (designed to lead the student from the first degree to a particular profession) include business administration, journalism, social work, international relations and urban planning. They are structured, usually require completion of 36-48 units and are unlikely to include a thesis option. These degrees do not require a first degree in a particular field, although in some cases they may require a certain amount of study in a particular field. It is very difficult to complete professional degrees in one year.

The Ph. D requires at least 3 years beyond the Bachelor's, but is rarely completed in less than 5 or 6 years as most students take on teaching or research assignments during their studies. Students are required to complete 2 years of course-work culminating in oral and written qualifying exams (called preliminary exams) before being admitted to candidacy for the Ph. D. and embarking on dissertation research. Students may also have to complete certain foreign language requirements at this time. A dissertation (300-400 typed pages) of publishable quality work is then required. Thereafter an oral exam or "defense" completes the degree.

Passage B Applying for Studying in USA

Most colleges are looking for a varied student population that comes from many backgrounds and represents many different academic interests and personal qualities. Don't forget to stress the unique experience you will bring to the school by being an international student.

The sooner the college receives your application and all the required supporting documents, the sooner they will be reviewed and evaluated.

Post samples of your writing, artwork, or tapes of musical performances, as applicable to the program of study you wish to pursue. They need to get to know you as a person, not just your academic achievements and test results. Make the most of this opportunity.

The Application Package

A complete application typically contains the following:

- fully completed application form
- teacher recommendations
- · transcripts and academic records
- TOEFL or other English language proficiency test scores
- standardized test scores
- nonacademic information as requested by the college or university
 - financial aid application
 - application fee

It's a good idea to enclose with your application several mailing labels filled out with your address. The admission office will appreciate your thoughtfulness.

Teacher Recommendations

Policies regarding teacher recommendations vary from college to college, but you should be prepared to have at least one teacher provide a reference for you.

Secondary School Reports and Transcripts

The school report should talk about your accomplishments and provide a prediction of your chances for success in university-level studies (if you are applying to undergraduate institutions). Your official transcript or academic record is the objective part of your application. Ask your school to include a guide to the grading standards used in the educational system in your country and for your school specifically. If your school does not rank students, an estimate of your rank, for example top 10 percent would be helpful. Be sure to have records sent that describe your academic performance for the past three to four years. If there is a national school-leaving certificate examination at the end of secondary education, you should send it to the university you apply to.

Have official results sent as soon as they are available.

If your transcripts, academic records, and leaving-certificate examination results are not in English, make sure that you have officially certified literal English translations of all documents sent along with the official documents in the original language.
