Up, up, and away

Debbie Huckabee is afraid of heights. She never planned to take a ride in a hot air balloon. The idea of going up hundreds of feet into the air frightened her. But last Saturday the bank where Huckabee works offered hot air balloon rides to its employees. The rides were free. So she decided to go ballooning. Huckabee saw Illinois from a new view!

"I loved riding in a hot air balloon. It was completely different from anything else I've ever done. It was so exciting that I lost my fear of heights. I think it was a great experience for me," Huckabee said.

The company that offers the balloon rides is called *Blue Sky Ballooning*. Mike Thomas is a pilot for Blue Sky. He said, "Most people who take balloon rides are celebrating some-thing special like an anniversary, a birthday, or a wedding." The cost of a ride is \$150 per person.

Balloon rides are for people who want to have a new kind of experience. Thomas said that ballooning is very safe. Almost anyone can go for a balloon ride. Lots of senior citizens go ballooning.

Huckabee liked looking at Illinois from up high. "I never knew that Illinois was so beautiful," she said. "There are rivers and fields and lots of color. We don't have mountains or oceans, but it is very pretty."

Hot air ballooning is usually done in the early morning or late afternoon. That is when there is not much wind. People who want to ride in a hot air balloon have to be patient. Weather conditions are very important. Sometimes you have to wait for the weather conditions to change.

The ride takes about an hour. Then the pilot looks for a place to land the balloon. A car follows the balloon. The car meets the balloon when it lands. Huckabee thinks that landing is one of the best parts of the ride. "It's really exciting. You never know where you are going to land," she said. "It's fun because people come to meet you when the balloon lands. You meet all kinds of nice people. They are so happy to see you."

Debbie Huckabee felt very proud of herself after her first ride. In fact, she felt so confident that she went up three times on Saturday! "It was truly a wonderful experience and I can't wait to do it again!"




