### **Preface**

75 Readings: An Anthology introduces students to a range of classic and contemporary essays. The text also exposes them to a variety of rhetorical strategies, writing styles, themes, and topics. At the same time, it retains maximum flexibility for the instructor. We have continued to look for essays that provide good structural models for rhetorical techniques and that raise complex questions about current and enduring issues. Thus, the selections in this text need not be used merely to illustrate form.

For instructors who like the selections but do not organize their classes around rhetorical modes, we have included two alternate tables of contents, which arrange selections by themes and genres. Moreover, because there is no pedagogical apparatus in the text itself to direct its use, 75 Readings is particularly adaptable to a variety of teaching approaches. However, for instructors who desire apparatus, the instructor's manual provides, for each selection, a brief author biography, comments introducing the essay, questions for discussion, prompts for responding to and engaging the text, and suggestions for sustained writing.

As with previous editions, we have sought the advice of many colleagues across the country to determine changes that would make this book even more effective and appealing as a learning tool for college readers and writers. Many of these professionals have put both the new and the old selections in this book to the ultimate test by using them in their classrooms. They have also provided helpful suggestions that have enabled us to fashion a new table of contents that makes 75 Readings more versatile and more representative of contemporary American cultures than ever before.
