# 前言

研究生英语教学的目的在于培养研究生的英语综合应用能力,使学生从运用中学习语言,帮助学生跨越语言障碍。因此,我们在研究生英语教学中进行了长期的探索与实践,从 2003 年开始着手编写全新模式的试用教程,并在 2003 - 2005 级硕士研究生英语实验班中使用。在对 687 名研究生的问卷调查中,学生们认为新教程将听说读写译有机地结合在一起,创造了轻松的学习环境,再现了语言的自主性,同时,加强了师生间的互动,激发了自主学习的兴趣。

本教程分为课内版、课外版两册,涉及大学校园生活、爱情与婚姻、健康、性别差异、伦理道德、自然与奇迹、体育运动、音乐、文化差异、高科技、宗教与信仰等内容。课内版形式多样,包括影音输入、情景对话、问卷调查、角色扮演、访谈辩论等活动;并附有相关的口语功能表达方式、词汇短语及写作指导等内容。课外版包括视听及读写两大版块,新颖的命题设计,相关的词汇注解,利于学生课外自学,增加语言技能储备。

本教程具有以下四个特点:

- 1.课堂内外兼顾 课内版活动设计和安排以互动学习为中心,强调应用能 力的培养;课外版配合使用,创造更多的语言环境。
- 2. 五大技能融合 本教程听、说、读、写、译有机结合,穿插在课内、课外两 个版本中,符合语言学习教学规律。
- 3. 综合能力训练 包括用英语撰写论文摘要、文章综述,进行简短口头报 告及提高就相关主题提问和回答问题能力等。
- 4. 开放互动交流 学生可以通过相互交谈、相互提问,甚至相互争论完成 交流任务,学会用英语连贯、自然、流畅地进行交际。

本教程内容根据 60 学时编排,教师可以根据学生的英语水平选择使用,真正做到因材施教。

本教程是哈尔滨工业大学"十一五"规划教材,得到了研究生院资助及有关专家的支持。宋飞焱、暴丽影老师参加了本教程前期编写工作,Mary Thompson (英)审阅本教程,并与 Jimmy C. Crown 为部分章节录音, Emily Adamson(英)也对本教程进行了审阅,在此表示特别感谢。





Psychology: Volunteer at a crisis hotline; work with children in shelters, day care centers, and schools; work with people who are mentally ill; work with youth in transitional housing; volunteer in substance abuse clinics, hospitals, and prevention centers; lobby on behalf of people who are mentally ill.

# Focus II Who Gets the Scholarship?

**Imagine each group is one person.** You've heard that one of you is going to receive a scholarship to study law at a university in America. The scholarship is worth US\$100,000 for four years. No.1 aged 20, a quiet attractive girl, responsible and able, but easily persuaded by others. Engaged to be married to a doctor, would like to finish her university studies before settling down. Her fiance says: "I want Carole to fulfill herself in every way, but of course once she is married, home and children will occupy her first and foremost." Her parents cannot afford to finance the course.

No.2 aged 21, single, the daughter and granddaughter of lawyers. Enthusiastic promoter of Women's Liberation, ambitious and career-minded. Academic record erratic, some very good results, some not so good. Had a mental breakdown last year, was in hospital for three months but appears to have made a full recovery. Parents cannot finance her studies. In character rather aggressive and quick-tempered, but generous, a good friend.

No.3 aged 24, has been in the army and active in service, divorced, no family. Highly motivated, wants eventually to go into politics. "I want this course more than anything." He says, "and only the scholarship can get it for me." While in the army was once found guilty for accepting bribes. Charming personality, fluent and eloquent speaker.

No.4. aged 19, brilliant but not very hard-working. A likeable personality, has extreme political views, has taken part in some violent demonstrations and has been in prison at least once as a result. Lots of girlfriends, has a reputation for treating them very badly. Very musical, had founded and run a pop-group. Will probably make this his career if he fails the scholarship, which would be a "waste" according to his school tutor who recommends him.

No.5 aged 37, not of outstanding natural ability but very hard working. Married with 3 children; until now a primary school teacher. His application was probably due to his wife's ambition. He made a good impression, but seems a little nervous at the whole idea and the effects, his new career might have on social life and family. If he fails the scholarship he will go back to office work.
