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
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
About the Authors

Tang Xiyang is a well known writer and nature conservation activist. He was editor-in-chief, before he retired, of **Nature**, a magazine established by the Beijing Nature Museum. Through his travels and work as a journalist he has built up a fund of knowledge about nature conservation in China and overseas.

In 1982 Tang Xiyang met Marcia Marks, an American foreign expert, in Xishuangbanna when they both made a trip to see and investigate the condition of Asiatic wild elephants. They shared common interests and ideals and eventually became husband and wife. In the period from 1989 to 1992 the couple made investigative tours of the Soviet Union, Germany, Switzerland, France, Britain, the United States, Canada and Hong Kong visiting more than 50 national parks and nature reserves. This book, written by both of them, describes the different approaches to nature conservation in these countries and discusses the emerging situation in China.





















