





He is a council member and Executive Vice-chairman of Jilin Province of the Chinese Acupuncture Society; an editorial committee member for the Journal of Acupuncture Research, China Tui Na, Journal of Traditional Chinese Osteo-Traumatology, Asian Pacific Traditional Medicine, and American TCM. He has published about 120 papers and 80 academic works, such as: Specific Theory of Points, Micro-Acupuncture Therapy, Atlas of Newly Discovered and Extra Points, Practical Acupuncture Technique, and Essential Reader of Clinical TCM. 




