A Community Web Site for the World

Maya Wouters used Craigslist to sell her car when she moved from Atlanta to New York City last year. When she got to New York, she used Craigslist to furnish her new apartment. It worked out so well that she then used it to find a roommate, sign up for a book club, and find a good place to walk her dog. Six months after she moved to New York, she met her fiancé through a personal ad posted on Craigslist. Craigslist is a wildly successful Internet bulletin board where people can post and respond to ads to sell their possessions, look for dates, express political views, seek advice, and find an

Today, Craigslist has more than 10 million users and more than 2.5 billion page views per month. It serves 34 countries on 5 continents with more than 170 individual city sites. Amazingly, Craigslist remains a very small operation, employing only 18 people in a small office in its birthplace of San Francisco.

Craigslist is described as a collection of communities with similar spirit. And although Craigslist is extremely large, every user has a voice. People like Craigslist because it puts them in touch with their neighbors and makes big cities feel like intimate communities.

Craigslist doesn't sell advertising, and it doesn't accept outside investments. So how does Craigslist make money? It charges for help-wanted ads in only three cities: New York, Los Angeles, and San Francisco. But its primary purpose is the same as it always was – to provide people with information about their city and help them find the resources they need to live there.


