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#### **CHAPTER 1. ABOUT THE SPEAKING TEST**



#### **DURATION AND FORMAT**

The Speaking Test is the last of the four tests in IELTS. It consists of an oral interview between the candidate and an IELTS trained examiner. The interview is scheduled either in the afternoon, after the other IELTS papers, or sometimes the following day (in large test centres).

The interview lasts for approximately **11–14 minutes**. It is recorded, because in the event of a re-mark it is reviewed, and also for IELTS examiner monitoring and standardisation.

The examiner is a qualified teacher who has been trained as an IELTS examiner and approved by the British Council or IDP IELTS Australia.

#### STRUCTURE OF THE INTERVIEW

There are three parts to the interview. The examiner will lead the candidate through these three parts: an introduction and interview [a series of short questions and answers]; an individual long turn [extended speaking] where the candidate speaks for one to two minutes on a selected topic [monologue]; and a two-way discussion [dialogue] thematically linked to the topic of the long turn.

7	Introductions 1 min	Examiner starts the test, introduces him/herself, and confirms the identity of the candidate
,	Interview 3-4 min	Examiner interviews candidate using verbal questions (Yes/No and "wh-—" questions) requiring short answers only. Topics are familiar and concrete.
2	Individual Long Turn Monologue 3-5 min	Examiner asks candidate to speak for 1–2 mins on a particular topic based on a written task card. Candidate has one minute to prepare, and may write some notes. Topics are more detailed. The examiner might conclude by asking one or two short questions.

The candidate is expected to generate longer responses to these questions.

in som what the mean by ...? **Question Types** 

The examiner controls the test and leads the candidate through the three parts of the interview. There are two question types-Yes/No questions (Polar Interrogatives) and "Wh-" questions.

Yes/No questions require a short answer, whereas "Wh---" questions (where, when, why) require a longer response.

In the "Long Turn" the candidate is expected to respond to the prompts written on the candidate task card.

#### **FACTORS IN THE ASSESSMENT**

The Speaking Test assesses your ability to communicate effectively in English. There are four performance descriptors which the examiner uses to determine the candidate's IELTS Band level:

- 1 Fluency and Cohesion
- 2 Lexical Resource (range of vocabulary)
- 3 Grammatical Range and Accuracy
- 4 Pronunciation: rhythm, stress, intonation, and the sounds of English

#### What do these mean?

Fluency means being able to talk with normal levels of continuity, at a normal rate and easily. Coherence means the ability to link ideas and language together so that the speech is coherent and connected.

Do you have to stop or pause often to search for a word to express what you want to say? You do not have to speak quickly, but you need to speak smoothly and you should not have to stop to think of the correct grammar or word. Keep your language flowing smoothly and confidently.

Fluency is measured by speech rate and continuity.

#### Coherence is achieved by:

- ▶ logical sequencing of sentences—order of information
- clear marking of stages in a discussion, narration or argument
- > use of cohesive devices (e.g. connectors, pronouns and conjunctions within and between sentences) to join and link information

Lexical Resource refers to the candidate's vocabulary range and the accuracy with which meanings and attitudes can be expressed.

Lexical resource is measured by:

- ▶ the variety of words used to discuss the range of IELTS topics
- > the adequacy and appropriacy of the words used
- > and the ability to manage a vocabulary gap by using other words or

**Grammatical Range and Accuracy** refers to the candidate's grammatical range and how accurately and appropriately it is used. Grammatical range is measured by:

- ▶ the length and complexity of the spoken sentences (the variety of Simple, Compound and Complex sentence structures)
- > the appropriate use of subordinate clauses
- > and the range of sentence structures, especially the ability to move parts of the sentence around for highlighting and information focus.

Grammatical accuracy is measured by:

- ▶ the number of grammatical errors in a given amount of speech
- > and how errors affect communication.

**Pronunciation** refers to the candidate's ability to produce speech which is comprehensible.

Is your accent strong? Can you make the sounds of English clearly? Can you stress words for meaning and significance? Can you stress syllables correctly? Can you maintain a natural rhythm in your spoken language?

Pronunciation means:

- D the sounds of English
- > syllable stress and word stress
- ▷ rhythm

Pronunciation is measured by:

- > the amount of strain caused to the listener
- ▶ the degree to which the speech is unintelligible
- and the degree of influence or interference from the candidate's first language (ie mother tongue)

#### **TEST TIPS**

- speak clearly and audibly
- short answers are appropriate in Part 1, but longer answers are necessary in Part 2 (the "Long Turn"), and Part 3 (discussion) where you must expand on your answers giving examples, explaining, and volunteering additional information

  - ▶ How important is the tourist dollar for the economy?
  - ▶ Will the tourist industry grow in the next 10-20 years? Why?
- What do you think of tourism designed not to damage the environment?
