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## The Editor's Notes

The Pudong Yearbook 1997 • English Version is the first English Yearbook edited and published by the Editorial Office of Pudong Yearbook under the leadership of the Pudong New Area Administrative Committee. The yearbook completely and systematically records the new achievements and experiences in politics, economy and socio-culture obtained by Pudong in the year of 1996 (from Jan. 1 through Dec. 31) and the new conditions and problems arose therein. Allowing for it being the first Pudong yearbook in English, it traces the trajectory of development in Pudong since its opening to the outside world, so as to offer a better knowledge of Pudong to the readers. We anticipate that the publication of the Pudong Yearbook will provide foreign countries with valuable information in their economic and technological cooperation and cultural exchange with Pudong and their investment in Pudong's development, and that it will serve as a window for personages of various circles to understand Pudong.

The information vehicle of the Pudong Yearbook 1997 includes writings, statistical data and pictures, in about 200 thousand words classified in 19 categories, such as chronicle of events, basic facts, development sub-districts, construction environment, finance, foreign economic relations and trade, industry, commerce, tourism, architecture, real estate, communication, post and telecommunications, public utilities, rural economy, economic management, politics, law, labor and personnel, science, education, public health

and social life, trying its best to show the present condition and trend in the development of Pudong to the readers.

In the light of the characteristics of Pudong's opening to the outside world, and on the basis of encyclopaedic depiction, the Yearbook lays stress on recording and narrating the categories of development sub-districts and economic construction. It devotes detailed introduction in separate sections to the four development zones at state-level and five development sub-districts at municipality-level, and special description to the frequent foreign economic activities and wide-ranging investment in Pudong.

As a sign of China's reform and opening, and a new administrative division, Pudong has achieved remarkable results in a short period of several years, which reveal a picture of prosperity and promise of a new urban area. Our regret is that we failed in introducing it with nothing left out.
