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Introduction

A synonym is a word that means something similar to another word. This dictionary lists the synonyms for common English words. In many entries, antonyms—words that mean the opposite of another word—are also shown.

Chambers Dictionary of Synonyms and Antonyms is based on Chambers Thesaurus, which itself is drawn from the extensive Chambers English Dictionary database.

How to use this book

Suppose you want to find a synonym for the word interesting. You may have used this word already or you may want to vary the style of what you are writing or saying. If you look up the entry interesting, after the part-of-speech marker adj. you will see a list of synonyms in alphabetical order: absorbing, appealing, attractive, compelling. etc. Antonyms are given at the end of many entries, for example at interesting: boring, dull, monotonous, tedious.

Many entries are divided into numbered sections. This means that the word has several meanings. See, for example, the entry vain, which is divided into two parts:

1 abortive, empty, fruitless, futile . . . 2 affected, arrogant, bigheaded, conceited . . .

Words in the first part could replace vain in the phrase a vain attempt; words in the second part describe someone who is very proud. The numbered sections are usually given in order of frequency.

The numbers for the antonyms at the end of such entries refer to the numbered meanings of the synonyms. For example, some opposites of the first meaning of vain are given: fruitful, successful; and of the second meaning: modest, self-effacing.

At the end of some entries, some phrases that use the main headword are included. For example, at once is given at once and in order to at order.

Some entries have small raised numbers, for example lock¹ (a bolt) and lock² (of hair). This means that the words have a different history.

Note that no one word can be used in place of another word in every context. So if you are not sure of the meaning or use of one of the words included as a synonym, ask someone, or look the word up in a good dictionary such as *Chambers English Dictionary* or *Chambers Concise Dictionary*.

Two other points:

- 1. The oblique stroke / is used to show alternatives. For example at clarify shed/throw light on means both shed light on and throw light on.
- 2. Round brackets () are used to enclose optional information. For example, at everything the (whole) lot means both the lot and the whole lot.

This dictionary has been compiled to help you find the most appropriate word for a particular occasion. You will be able to include a more exact term in a report, a livelier phrase in a speech, a simpler expression in a letter. We hope that, not only will your skills in using English improve, but that you will enjoy sampling more of the varied delights of the English language.
