

Scripts and Keys for Part I

Exercise One

Section A

Direction: In this section, you will hear 10 short conversations. At the end of each conversation, a question will be asked about what was said. The conversation and question will be spoken only once. After each question there will be a pause. During the pause, you must read the four suggested answers marked A), B), C), D), and decide which is the best answer.

Example:

You will hear:

Man: Is there any assignment for next Tuesday?

Woman: Nothing to read or write, but we are supposed to listen to a radio program and be ready to talk about it in class.

Question: What have the students been asked to do before Tuesday?

You will read: A) Read a book.

- C) Talk about a problem.
- D) Listen to the radio.

From the conversation we know that the assignment is to listen to a radio program and be ready to talk about it. The best answer, then, is D), "Listen to the radio." Therefore, you should choose answer D).

Section B

Questions 11 to 13 are based on the following passage:

Early in the 19th century, no medical college would accept a woman student. Elizabeth Blackwell, however, was determined to become a doctor. The young American wrote again and again to a number of medical colleges, asking if she could be enrolled, but each time the answer was No.

Then one day, to her surprise, she got a letter from the dean of a college in Geneva, which said "Yes".

At first Geneva College, like the other colleges, was not willing to enrol Liza. But later several important people at the college learned that Liza's application had the support of a famous doctor, and they were afraid to offend this man.

He would then place the cat in the old lady's garden where she would find it, think it was one of her own, and give Walter 10p for burying it.
