前 言

本书根据教育部最新公布的全国硕士研究生入学统一考试英语考试大纲(非英语专业)中的词汇表编写,涵盖了大纲中所有考研词汇,同时也囊括了历年真题中所出现的常考超纲词汇。

本书编者长期从事考研英语辅导工作以及研究生英语教学工作,出版过多部深受考生喜爱的考研辅导丛书。本书把大纲词汇按难易程度进行了分级,考生可根据自身的英语水平选择合适有效的复习策略。本书打破了以往很多词汇书主次不清、难易不分、要求考生平均分配时间和精力的编排方式,而是给考生以更明确的指导,既节省了时间,又提高了效率,可以帮助考生在最短的时间内对考研词汇做到全面的掌握和运用。

本书在以下方面精心构思:

为加强复习的针对性,本书设置了基础词汇和高频词汇测试成绩与复习建议对照表,可以对不同水平的考生给予不同的复习建议。

本书正文包括考研基础词汇及测试题、考研高频词汇及测试题、 考研低频词汇和考研超纲词汇四个部分。在基础词汇和高频词汇前各 提供了一定数量的测试题,考生在学习词汇之前最好先进行自我测试, 然后根据测试成绩,再参照本书提供的建议和策略,制订出自己的复 习计划。

本书高频词汇部分采用的是以句带词、以词带词的独到编排方法。本书一反多数词汇手册和工具书以词带句的惯常安排,而是先呈现给读者一个在历年真题中出现的句子,而后才是单词的常规信息。为了有效地帮助考生横向快速扩展词汇,本书还设置了"想一想"栏目,并率先推出了让考生耳目一新的"联想词"。这样做可以让考生开阔视野,举一反三,成串记忆。因为这一部分的单词是考生应重点掌握的单词,考生不但要掌握单词的几层意思及其扩展词,还要熟悉其用法。另外,英语中有许多特殊用法、习惯搭配是在语言形成和发展的长期过程中保留下来的,无法套用一般的语法规则来解释。针对这种情况,本书在相关词条下设有"名师导学"栏目,虽寥寥数语,却能一针见血地解开许多考生百思不解的疑惑。

·本书的另一个重要特点就是高度重视历年真题。考研英语经过 十几年的发展,出题具有一定的重复性。本书绝大多数例句摘自过 去十年来的全真考研试卷,这是考研之前极好的热身训练。为了更 好地帮助考生比较同义项在英汉双语语境中的异同,以及更好地学 习记忆词汇,也为例句附上了汉语译文,让考生在记忆词汇的同时, 进行考试真题的实战演练,以使考生在考场上面对试题时也能从容 不迫、驾轻就熟。 本书附录的编排打破了常规的结构安排,加入了考研常用词组和 考研常用写作词汇两类应试性内容。考生使用本书既能掌握单词、词组,又能提高写作能力。

本书为考生提供了最佳的考研英语词汇解决方案。仔细研读本书,突破词汇难关指日可待。

- 在每个周期中,将每天的单词分成 2~3 个时间段来记忆,多次少量比少次多量的效果要好。不断总结构词法,将构词法知识运用在记
- 在每次记忆词汇的过程中, 一定要对不同陌生程度的单词做上不同的标记。在反复记忆的过程中, 一定要反复标记, 反复筛选陌生词汇。
- 每次在记忆新词之前,一定要先浏览前一天已背的词汇。同一个周期中,要尽可能地充分利用零碎时间,在不同的场景下反复记忆。
