Preface

One will find a number of China tour books in American bookstores, but they are all written by non-Chinese authors. Some of these writers are still not quite free from the biases and stereotypes about China long existing in the West. The present English guidebook is the only one I have seen so far penned by a Chinese. Professor Zeng Xianling, one of the book's chief editors, is no ordinary Chinese. She has taught English for many years at universities in China, has edited and compiled several different kinds of Chinese-English and English-Chinese dictionaries. For the past decade, she has also lived in America. Arguably, she knows both China and America well, thus eminently qualified for the task she has been engaged in.

The present volume, though compact in size, covers a wide range of subjects. After thumbing through the pages, I felt that I had a tour d'horizon of China, gaining an understanding of its history, culture, geography, and getting to know some of its famous modern artists, poets of the Tang dynasty and ancient philosophers and so on. It's quite educational besides its usefulness. For instance, the author notes in the chapter on "Culture Differences between East and West" that "it is very common to see two people of the same sex holding hands or walking arm in arm." To the Western eye, this is odd, or "queer" indeed. A Westerner automatically assumes that a same-sex couple displaying such intimacy in public must be gay or lesbian. However, the author points out that such

behavior is normal in China. It is just a gesture of friendship and nothing more. This is worth knowing for a foreigner.

For those who know Chinese, this book will prove doubly beneficial because it's essentially bilingual. Most Chinese texts accompany the English expositions or explanations. If you know Chinese, you can read both versions of the same topic, and will get a better appreciation of the subject matter so delineated.

Admittedly, Chinese is a difficult language for the Westerner, but to know a bit of the language will both facilitate your trip and enhance your enjoyment while in China. For this purpose, the author devotes a part of the guidebook to learning Chinese. This includes simple daily conversations and basic pattern practices. More importantly, attached at the end of the book is a Basic Dictionary. This wordbook, consisting of an English vocabulary accompanied by its Chinese equivalent in Pinyin pronunciation, should be pretty helpful.

The Shanghai Expo has generated enormous interest in China. Additionally, other events and culture festivities are attracting an ever-increasing number of visitors to China. Professor Zeng's guidebook, revised and updated since its first publication will surely fill the needs of China-bound visitors. I take great pleasure in recommending this gem of its genre to the English speaking readership.

Part I

The Brief History of Shanghai

Shanghai is the most prosperous economic, financial and commercial city in China. It is a city rich in culture and an advanced technology center: a modernized metropolis; a sneak preview of what future cities will be like. With a population of about 19 million and rapid development, Shanghai quickly became a symbol of China's remarkable growth and international clout. People from all over the world are taking notice, coming to trade, shop and tour. Shanghai has been the host to many important international conferences and exhibitions that have increased its international profile.

Two abbreviated names for Shanghai in Chinese are "Hu"(沪) and "Shen"(申).

Shanghai sits on the Yangtze River Delta on China's eastern coast. The city is divided by the Huangpu River into Pudong, the east side and Puxi, the west side, districts. Shanghai has four distinct seasons: January and February are the coldest months; July and August are the hottest months and the most pleasant seasons, which are
