

丛书总序

现今许多人都热衷于学习英语,因为英语应用范围广泛,便于与外国进行工商贸易、文化交往,也有助于个人进修、吸收新的科技资讯。但是一般英语学习者往往在学了不少入门知识,做了许多听、读、讲、写的练习之后,仍然感到不能真正掌握和通晓英语,还需要想办法进一步提高自己的英语水平。

本丛书就是为这些英语读者设计的。它从 英语的各个方面,如词汇、句子、成语、谚语、书 信、翻译等,作系统、由浅入深的介绍,同时,除 了介绍语言知识之外,还特别注意指出有关的 西方生活、文化知识及其准确地道的说法,使读 者能在原有的基础上更上一层楼。

本丛书旨在使广大读者在繁忙的生活和工作中,采取每日学一点的形式学好英语。文字力求浅白,内容尽量简明;有分析、有实例;小开本,加插图,读者可以利用自己的零碎时间,随时随地学习,轻松愉快地在增加英语知识和加强运用能力两个方面得到收获。

前言

"成语"是指一种语言中长期以来习用的、 表认完整意义的、结构相对固定的词组或短句。 任何一种语言都存有许多成语,英语中的成语 尤为丰富。成语有两个主要特征:语义上的完 整性和结构上的固定性。一个成语是一个语义 单位,表达一个完整的意思,但它的意义却不能 只从它所包含的单词的字面意义去推测。例如 under the weather 意为"身体不适",这和 "under"、"weather"的意义都没有关系:结构上 的固定性指的是:一个成语中的词不能随意改 动或增减,例如 under the weather 就不能改为 below the weather, put on airs 就不能说成 put on air。这两个特征显然给学习者造成困难,因 为,学习一个成语就必须死记硬背,记住它的构 成,记住它的意义。但另一方面,成语又十分有 趣,因为,和任何语言中的成语一样,英语中的 成语并不是英语的使用者生拼硬造的,而是在 长期的生活过程中自然、渐渐地产生、沿用,最 终固定下来的,因此,不少成语的背后都有一个 和社会生活、民族文化有关的故事。由此可知, 能恰如其分地运用成语无疑会使我们的语言表 达得更确切和更生动。

迄今为止,英语成语手册、成语辞典,乃至

成语大全之类的书已经出了不少,而这本只收 了三百六十五个英语成语的小册子有什么特色 和优点呢?首先,本书有着明确的对象,即具有 中等英语水平的读者,在编写过程中,我始终以 照顾这个层次读者的特定水平和需要为大前 题:其二,本书所收的三百六十五个成语是从几 千个英语成语中挑选出来的,其中剔除了那些 用得讨滥和那些过于冷僻的,也免去那些在文 体上讨分正式,或属于俚语和具有强烈地方色 彩的成语,故可以说,所选取的成语均属英语成 语中的"核心"部分:三,本书不仅清楚地讲解每 个成语的意义和出处,而且更通过简明易懂的 例句来展示如何使用该成语,并指出在使用时 容易发生的错误;四,全书文字力求生动活泼. 以谈话的风格把一个个成语介绍给读者,使人 在读来感到轻松、亲切之余,也加快吸收的速 度。

总而言之,我的意图是把这个小册子写成一本集知识性和趣味性于一身,适合中等水平读者口味和需要的工具书。它"一日一篇"的编排方式能方便读者在繁忙、节奏急促的生活中抽空日读一篇,化整为零;同时,它也可以作为英语学习者的一本案头书,随时查用。
