

Madison McNutt, 12, and his brother Wilder, 8, live in the southern African country of Botswana at Wild Dog Research Camp, where their father studies wild dogs and other big predators(捕食性动物). Their mother works with local children, teaching them about conservation of the natural world.

Pearl Buck was the first American woman to be awarded the Nobel Prize in Literature. She wrote more than one hundred books. But most people remember Pearl Buck for her novels about China. She knew the country and its people very well. For nearly forty years, China was her home.

Pearl's parents were Caroline and Absalom Sydenstricker. They were religious workers in China. In 1892 they were visiting in the United States when Pearl was born in Hillsboro, West Virginia. Three months after her birth, the family left the United States and moved back to China.

Pearl and her family lived among the Chinese people. Pearl's education began at home. Her mother taught her many of the things she would have learned in an American school. A Chinese tutor taught Pearl other subjects. They included the writings of the famous thinker Confucius and Chinese reading. writing and history. When she was seven, she began reading the works of British writer Charles Dickens. Many years later, after she had become a famous author, she said that Dickens' writing style had the greatest influence on her own style.

Her first novel was called East Wind, West Wind, It tells the story of a Chinese girl who learns about the western world. But it was Pearl Buck's next book that made her famous and brought the money she needed. The Good Earth became the top selling book in the United States in 1931 and 1932. Pearl Buck won the Pulitzer Prize. The next year, Pearl Buck was awarded the Nobel Prize in Literature.

After almost forty years in China, the writer moved back to the United States. Pearl Buck gave many speeches in America. She talked to young people about the importance of a good education. After a year of being prepared, Laura Dekker can't wait to set sail. Last August, the Dutch government decided that Laura was too young to take on the challenge of sailing around the world alone. But after a year of preparing herself, Laura has been permitted to sail. Even with the delay, she stands to become the youngest person to sail around the world on a solo (独自的) voyage.

"I was so happy I almost jumped into the water," Laura

Katharine Graham, once described as "the most powerful woman in America", was the owner and publisher of The Washington Post newspaper. Under her leadership, it became one of the most important newspapers in the country.

Katharine Graham was born in New York City in 1917. Graduated from the University of Chicago in 1938, Katherine got a job as a reporter for a newspaper in San Francisco, California, In 1933, Katharine's father had bought a failing newspaper, The Washington Post. It was the least successful of the five newspapers in Washington.

Soon Katharine returned to Washington and got a job editing letters to the editor of her father's newspaper. In 1946, her husband Philip Graham became publisher of The Washington Post. When she was 46, her husband died, leaving Katharine Graham four children to raise and a newspaper to operate. That was really a big challenge for her.

At first, she was concerned only with finding a way to keep control of The Washington Post until her sons were old enough to lead it. She had no training in business or experience in operating a large company and decided to learn. She hired excellent reporters and editors. In 1969, Katharine Graham became publisher as well as president of The Washington Post Company. In the 1970s, The Washington Post became famous around the world. Katharine Graham also played an important role in supporting women by employing more of them.

When she was eighty years old, Katharine Graham wrote a very popular book called Personal History about her life, which won a Pulitzer Prize for biography in 1998. Friends of Katharine Graham said she used her intelligence and bravery to improve the American media.

Sydney Newton, a Limestone County 6-year-old girl, has a new piece of jewelry that circles her neck three times. It's made with beads of every color, shape and size, and she strung(串起) all of them during the last six months of her journey battling cancer.

Replicas(复制品) of some of those beads, along with a few newly designed beads, will fly with space shuttle Atlantis when it lifts off Friday afternoon from Kennedy Space Center.

Sydney's father, Jamie Newton, works at Marshall Space Flight Center. When he suggested to NASA about the beads going into space, the agency loved his idea and processed it quickly in order to make the flight. NASA awarded 8 ounces of payload(有效载荷) space to Beads of Courage—the non-profit group that gives the beads to children with serious illnesses like Sydney. On Friday, 17 beads will be flown as one 8-ounce unit.

"It's another way of encouraging these kids," Jamie Newton said. "We want to give these children courage to get through this and help them reach beyond the Earth and stars. We can encourage these kids to fight so they can grow up to be the next astronaut and engineer," he said.

The Newtons left Tuesday for Kennedy Space Center. NASA officials invited them to watch the Atlantis launch as a family.

Sydney got her beads six months ago when she was at Birmingham's Children's Hospital undergoing treatment for cancer. Each bead is different and symbolizes a struggle or a passed milestone in a child's journey with the illness. "It's something to show all that she's been through," Cynthia Newton said. "She hangs it on her IV pole."

In 1960, English teacher George Ariffe made a lasting impression on one of his students, 16-year-old Philip Blackwell.

"My junior year was really an awkward year," Blackwell told The Chicago Tribune. "There was an in-group, and I wasn't in it." Blackwell made an effort to pull Ariffe out of his dark period by reading his favorite poems to him. He would read him short pieces from Milton, Chaucer, and Shakespeare—many of the same poems that Arliffe had asked Blackwell and his other students to memorize decades ago.

Blackwell's friendship has helped transform Ariffe's outlook(看法) on life. In the aftermath of the stroke, Ariffe had turned away food; now, he eats with pleasure, and always looks forward to Blackwell's visits.

Though the one-time teacher still struggles to speak, he has no trouble expressing his gratitude towards his dear friend.

"This one is the best," he said, pointing at Blackwell.

A 13-year-old American boy became the youngest climber to reach the top of Mount Everest on Saturday, breaking the former record as part of his quest to climb the highest peaks on all seven continents. A spokesman for Jordan Romero said the boy's team called him by satellite phone from the summit (山顶) of the world's highest mountain, 29 035 feet above sea level. The record for the youngest climber to scale Everest had been held by Temba Tsheri of Nepal, who reached the peak at age 16.

"Their dreams have now come true. Everyone sounded unbelievably happy," a new statement on Romero's blog said Saturday morning. The teenager with long curly hair—who climbed Mount Kilimanjaro in Africa when he was 10 years old—has said he was inspired by a painting in his school hallway of the seven continents' highest summits. "Every step I take is finally toward the biggest goal of my life, to stand on top of the world," Romero said in an earlier post on his blog.

"I'm just very proud of him," Romero's mother told the Associated Press by telephone just before he reached the peak, as she watched his progress online on a live GPS tracker. When asked what she would say to him once he reached the summit, she started crying, "I can't really say that. It's just emotional."

Romero, from Big Bear, California, was climbing Everest with his father, his father's girlfriend and three Sherpa guides. He left for the peak from the base camp on the Chinese side. Everest was Jordan Romero's first challenge above 26 240 feet. Unlike neighboring Nepal, the other approach to Everest, China has no age limit for climbers. Romero registered(注册) with Chinese officials in April, said Zhang Mingxing, secretary general of China Tibet Mountaineering Association.
