### **Part II** Reading Comprehension

阅读导航

阅读是掌握语言知识,获取信息,提高听、说、读、写、译等能力的基础。阅读 能力的测试一直在各类英语考试中占据重要的地位。因此,阅读能力是大学英语训练 的重中之重。


在大学英语四级新题型考试中,阅读理解题所占分值为35%。其中快速阅读占 10%, 篇章阅读理解(传统阅读理解)和篇章词汇理解共占 25%。测试角度不再仅仅 考查考生对单词、句子的理解, 而是着重考查学生对整个篇章的宏观掌控能力, 要求 考生能正确理解全文的主旨、每段的中心思想、段落与段落之间的逻辑联系、作者的 观点与态度以及文章的结论。单纯依靠回文定位技巧就能找到答案的题目比例大大下 降。可见,新四级阅读考试是从实用性角度考查考生英语知识运用能力,特别是理解 语篇结构的能力。单纯依赖考前的应试训练已经不足以使考生顺利通过四级考试。只 有平时加强阅读基本功的训练,特别要养成从篇章理解角度入手分析文章的习惯去掌 握文章的谋篇布局、编排逻辑、把握作者的写作意图才是解题之关键。

英语篇章组织的三大基本原则是时间、空间和逻辑。以说明文和议论文居多的 四级阅读文章中最常用的组织原则就是逻辑原则。建构在逻辑原则上的英语语篇模式 有以下8种:一般与个别(一般至具体)、因与果、问题与解决、转折与对比、比较、 举例、分类、列举等。这也是《新视野大学英语读写教程》每章阅读技巧训练的重 点。所以本册书各单元重点训练与教材各章节同步的语篇模式,提供此类语篇模式的 语篇标志词,并辅之各种阅读题型的训练。相信读者经过系统的操练可以迅速地掌握 阅读技巧、有效地提高阅读能力、提升英语整体水平。

#### 语篇模式

一般至具体结构

这是最常见的篇章展开模式。如图所示:



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按照"一般至具体"模式组织的段落或文章一般以概括性的陈述为开始,然后再提供具体的例子、事实、理由等来详细地阐述、论证、分析开篇的概述。

#### 语篇标志词

列举: firstly, in the first place, secondly, thirdly, my next point is, last/finally, etc.

例证: for example / for instance, to illustrate, an example / instance of this is, let's take..., take...for example, etc.

并列: on the one hand..., on the other hand...; however...; not only..., but also..., etc.

重述: in other words, that is to say, to put it another way, let me put it this way, or rather, namely, etc.

总结: to sum up, in short, it amounts to this, what I have been saying is this, etc.

#### From Our Darkest Day, Our Brightest Hope

That awful September morning, when jet-liners rained from the sky, and the worst anyone could imagine seemed possible, the Welch sisters had more reason than most to panic. Rumors of violent death swirled around their schools near Alexandria, Va., and Aubrey, Alyssa, Alana and Ashley knew for certain that their father had headed to work early that morning—at the Pentagon (五角大楼). "I was scared," says Alyssa, 10, the youngest. "I thought, 'Oh, no! My dad works in the west ring, where they're saying the plane hit!""

Lt. Col. Tracy L. Welch survived that day because he was walking to a meeting when Flight 77 hit the Pentagon. But it was hours before his daughters learned that their father was alive. The family's brush with disaster made the girls sensitive to the suffering of those who weren't so lucky. Then something important started, as it often does, with a simple idea.

#### A Flood of Support

On September 12, the girls decided to hold a car wash and donate the proceeds to the

American Red Cross. They called their effort "Wash America: Help Wash Away the Hurt" and contacted local radio stations to get the word out. Then the sisters set to work with buckets and water. They raised \$10,000 the first day, before the idea shot cross-country like water from a fire hose (消防水管). Last fall, people in 31 states scrubbed cars clean for Wash America. And when the suds (肥皂泡) were dry, they'd raised more than \$85,000 for the families of the victims.

"I never thought kids could change the world," says Aubrey, 15. "But now I know that when people come together, even average kids like us, you can do something."

Stories like the Welch sisters are proof that, though Sept. 11 was one of our nation's darkest day, Americans response to the tragedy has been one of the brightest chapters in our history. After the attacks, people everywhere asked instinctively, "What can I do?" And perhaps no group has been more anxious to help with the healing process than young people. Today, encouraged by President Bush's call to service and the newly formed USA Freedom Corps, record numbers of young volunteers are comforting victims of the terrorist attacks and tackling ongoing problems such as hunger and homelessness. And as National Volunteer Week begins today, communities across the country will honor those who are healing the world.

#### The Greatest Generation

The energy of 18-year-old Marquise McGraw could light up an entire New York City neighborhood. Marquise, a gifted, college-bound student, tutors young kids in science and, as part of his 4-H program, delivers computer presentations on the importance of staying in school. "I live in the projects," Marquise says, "and kids here don't always have the right role models. I wanted to encourage kids to follow in my footsteps." The attacks on his city made Marquise even more dedicated to service. Since September, he's been tutoring five days a week. "'Sept. 11' made me reconsider myself as a New Yorker and an American," Marquise says. "I realized you can't just say you'll help people later. It made me get to work."

Lately, Don Floyd, president and CEO of the National 4-H Council, has noticed many reactions like Marquise's. "Before 'Sept. 11', we took our volunteer spirit for granted, like we took so many things for granted," he says. "But volunteerism has become more important since 'Sept. 11'. I think it's because helping others knits us together. It makes us stronger."

#### Inside the "Hate-Free Zone"

Like many young volunteers, Gerardo Jerry Jimenez, 19, from Salem, Ore., was inspired by "Sept. 11" to fight harder against forces that were pulling his community apart. For years, Jerry had helped children threatened with domestic violence to find shelter. But in late September, fearing Muslims would face a blood of intolerance, Jerry and his youth group invited Muslim teens to a town hall meeting to offer their support. Then Jerry helped post "hate-free zone" signs in places where Muslims might face discrimination. "Learning that

I could help others gave me more hope than I ever had," he explains. "Community service changed my life."

The honor roll of young people who've changed others' lives is endless. Prudential Spirit of Community award-winner Rebecca Hill, 17, of Littleton, Colo., organized a concert called "United We Sing" and raised \$24,000 for the American Red Cross. And there's Kristen Hargis, 10, of Charlotte, N.C., who collected teddy bears and distributed them to New York City children traumatized (使受精神创伤) by the attacks.

For the many Americans still shocked from the attack on our country, and for millions of others whose problems require urgent attention, there is the promise that a newly-mobilized army of young volunteers is on the march to make a difference. "So often since 'Sept. 11', we've heard people say that America changed forever," says Steve Culbertson. "With young people like these leading the way, we have changed forever. We're better than before."

#### • Passage 1

The Organizing Committee for the Beijing 2008 Olympic Games (BOCOG) announced the route and design of the Olympic Torch for the Beijing Olympic Games at a ceremony held in the China Millennium Monument in Beijing.

The relay was expected to last 130 days and covered a distance of 137,000 kilometers, passing through five continents and visiting some of the principal points of the ancient Silk Road. With its theme "Journey of Harmony", and its slogan "Light the Passion, Share the Dream", the 2008 Olympic Torch Relay was an opportunity for BOCOG to share its Olympic message with the world.

One of the highlights of this leg was the attempt to bring the Olympic Flame to the highest peak in the world, Mt. Qomolangma. During the arrival ceremony for the flame into China on March 31, 2008, one of the lanterns with the Olympic Flame was kept aside. The torchbearer team was attempted to take the Flame to the highest peak on a day in May that presented the best climatic conditions for the ascent.

Also unveiled at the ceremony was the design of the Olympic Torch. It taked into account Chinese artistic heritage and technological expertise. The design of the aluminum Torch features traditional scrolls and a traditional Chinese design called "Lucky Cloud". It stands 72 centimeters high and weighs 985 grams.

The Torch incorporates technological innovations to be able to remain lit in winds of up to 65 kilometers an hour and lit in rain of up to 50 millimeters an hour. And the Torch can keep burning for 15 minutes. Other technological advancements prevent color discoloration and corrosion around the cone from which the Flame burns. The Torch construction is also environmental requirements.

"The torch is the symbol which embodies the Olympic Values of excellence, respect and friendship. They inspire us to be the best we can be in all that we do," added IOC President Jacques Rogge. "The magnificent design of the torch for the Beijing 2008 Olympic Torch Relay will also add a very unique Chinese flavor to the relay, as the 'Clouds of Promise' carry the Beijing Games' message to the world."
