

Preface

The Commission of the European Communities (Directorate-General Science, Research and Development—DG XII) is implementing a four-year (1985–1988) non-nuclear energy R & D programme for the development of renewable energy sources and, in particular, biomass.

This book presents the proceedings of the first meeting of contractors involved in the new biomass programme. It provides an overview of the Commission's future activity in this sector. Descriptions of the research programmes and preliminary results in the following specific areas were presented at this first contractors' meeting:

- —production of biomass for energy and improvement of productivity;
- —harvesting, transport, storage and drying of biomass;
- —conversion of biomass (ethanol fuels, basic studies on biological conversion, thermal conversion).

More than 70 researchers attended the meeting; virtually all the most important research organizations in Europe, working on bio-energy technologies, are involved in the collaborative programme. Each of the 81 contractors (only two were absent) had the opportunity to briefly present an outline of his activities, including goals and possible milestones to be reached.

At the end of the meeting there was a general discussion concerning the state of the art in the six particular fields of interest: production of biomass, improvement of productivity, harvesting, biological conversion, pyrolysis, gasification and synthesis gas.

Short summaries, prepared by the respective chairmen, are included in this book. The aim of such a meeting is to stimulate awareness of biomass as an energy resource and to encourage discussions to the benefit of future development. It is hoped that the programme will become a good example for the effectiveness of a European trans-national collaboration for large and complex research projects.
