

Every summer, thousands of disadvantaged and disabled youths, for whom summer camp would otherwise be just a dream, attend Lions-sponsored camps. Here they learn that people do care; that the future does hold possibilities; and that they can make their own opportunities.

The Lions-Quest "Skills for Growing" program for elementary school students and the "Skills for Adolescence" curriculum for middle school students have helped millions of young people around the world acquire the skills of self-esteem they need to live productive, happy, drug-free lives.

Through the Lions International Youth Exchange program, more than 5,000 youngsters travel yearly to a foreign country to live with a host family. There they learn to appreciate and understand cultures different from their own...and find the inspiration to help build a world that includes tolerance, compassion and sensitivity for all those who are different than themselves.

Campaign "SightFirst"


Worldwide, Lion Clubs are recognized for their service to the blind and visually impaired. This service began through a challenge issued by Helen Keller to become "knights of the blind in the crusade against darkness" during the Lions 1925 International Convention.

Established in 1990, SightFirst works to prevent and reverse blindness worldwide by closing the gap between existing health care services and those that remain desperately needed.

Today, more than 40 million people in the world are blind. Remarkably, 80 percent of these cases could have been prevented or are curable with proper treatment. The problem, however, is that the vast majority of people who are blind live in developing countries that lack the basic resources—clean water, sanitary living conditions, medical facilities—to fend off preventable diseases that cause blindness.

Working in cooperation with dedicated eye care professionals and eye health experts, governments and other concerned organizations, Lions have mobilized communities in every corner of the world to help fill the gap between all that is being done and all that needs to be done to overcome the tragedy of blindness wherever it strikes.


Financial support for SightFirst projects is provided by Campaign SightFirst, which depends on the fundraising activities of local clubs, donations by individual Lions, and the contributions of governments, foundations, and corporations.



Other Sight-Related Activities

In addition to the SightFirst program, Lions Clubs continue to support other sight-related activities:

- In the U.S., Canada, and United Kingdom, Lions cosponsor with 460 LensCrafters stores the *Give the Gift of Sight*, a special used eyeglass collection and recycling program.
- Lions provide 600,000 free professional glaucoma screenings and make 25,000 corneal transplants possible each year.
- Lions establish and support a majority of the world's eye banks, hundreds of clinics, hospitals, and eye research centers worldwide.
- Lions provide thousands each year with free quality eye care, eyeglasses, Braille-writers, large print texts, white canes, and guide dogs.
- Lions operate the vast majority of eye banks throughout the world and have donated hundreds of millions of dollars toward research, training, and rehabilitation for people who are blind

I'm not one of these people, I assure you of this, My eyesight, to me, I surely would miss.


I joined the Lions Club because they help the blind You can join too, would you be so kind?
