About the Authors

Timothy P. Trainer Mr. Trainer's intellectual property work began with the IPR Task Force at the U.S. Customs Service (today, Customs and Border Protection) in the late 1980s. He was one of the three original members of the IPR Branch at Customs Headquarters. His other government experience was with the U.S. Patent and Trademark Office's (USPTO) Office of Legislative and International Affairs. At Customs, he worked with field officers in determining whether to release, detain, or seize goods, drafted infringement decisions and regulations, and participated in interagency delegations in bilateral consultations with other governments. At the USPTO, he developed and delivered IPR enforcement training programs, represented the U.S. at the World Intellectual Property Organization, and participated in numerous government-to-government IPR consultations.

In the private sector, Mr. Trainer was an associate in the Washington, D.C., office of Arter & Hadden ('93-'96). In 1999, after leaving the USPTO, he was the president of the Washington, D.C., based International AntiCounterfeiting Coalition (IACC). At the IACC, he was responsible for its domestic and international programs. He participated in many IPR enforcement training programs, spoke at conferences, and testified before U.S. Congressional committees and commissions. He also co-chaired the UN Economic Commission for Europe's IP Advisory Group from October 2001 to March 2005 and was a member of

INTERPOL's IP Crime Action Group.

In March 2005, he founded the Global Intellectual Property Strategy Center, P.C., a consulting firm representing domestic and international clients. Since March 2005, he has also conducted training abroad at the request of the U.S. government on several occasions.

Mr. Trainer is an adjunct professor at American University's Washington College of Law and is on the Thomas Cooley Law School's Advisory Board for the IP LL.M. Program. He received his law degree from the Cleveland Marshall College of Law in 1986. He also has a Master of Arts Degree in Asian Studies from the University of Pittsburgh. Prior to his graduate studies at the University of Pittsburgh, he studied at Keio University's International Center in Tokyo in 1978-79.

Vicki Elaine Allums has more than fifteen years of legal and policy experience as a government and corporate attorney in the areas of domestic and international intellectual property (IP), licensing, IP enforcement and international trade matters. She has been a frequent speaker at intellectual property and international trade conferences around the world and has extensive experience representing the United States in bilateral and multilateral negotiations. She is currently Associate General Counsel for Intellectual Property at the Defense Information Systems Agency (DISA), an agency of the U.S. Department of Defense.

Prior to joining DISA, she was Associate General Counsel on the Executive Office team at The American Institute of Architects ("AIA"), a non-profit membership organization representing 75,000-plus architects and design professionals in the United States and abroad. At AIA, her practice focused on copyright, trademark, licensing, IP enforcement, Internet and transactional issues.

From 1998-2001, she was a senior attorney in the Office of Legislative and International Affairs at the U.S. Patent and Trademark Office, where she advised Executive Branch agencies, including the Office of the United States Trade Representative (USTR) and the U.S. Department of Commerce, on intellectual property enforcement and other trade policy issues. She developed and/or participated in IP training programs and seminars in China, Thailand, Egypt, Taiwan, Kenya, Senegal and Switzerland.

She was also Assistant General Counsel at National Public Radio Inc. (NPR), where she advised NPR senior managers and staff on a variety of trademark and licensing issues in transactions involving entertainment, cultural and news programming. Ms. Allums was a senior attorney in the Intellectual Property Branch at U.S. Customs. In that capacity, she drafted administrative de-
