

- It enables the diver to breathe without raising his face from the water. In this way he can remain on the surface for sometime while watching the water beneath. Then, when he sees something interesting, he can dive down.
 - It is possible to stay under water only as long as one can hold one's breath, while using snorkelling equipment, and one can only go to a depth of about twenty to thirty feet.
- 'Aqua' means water and 'lung' suggests breathing. The whole word 'aqua-lung' therefore suggests a means of breathing under water.
