Mention to someone that you are a surface pattern designer and you will probably receive a blank look of confusion. Perhaps they will hear the word 'pattern' and think you design patterns for clothing, or that by 'surface' you are referring to the different types of finish used in building and decorating trades. Either way, they won't realize you are a graphic designer, illustrator, textile designer and more, all rolled into one. Pretty much anything you see in the marketplace that has a printed design on it will have been through the hands of a surface designer. The plates you eat from, the fabric of your tablecloth, the design on your rug, your curtains, wallpaper, cushions, handbags, wrapping paper, birthday card, and so much more, any product with a surface print or pattern on it is part of this often overlooked form of design.

When I first began to use the internet as a research tool for my job as a designer, I could find no website or blog dedicated solely to surface design, instead they seemed always to include furniture, fashion and three-dimensional design in between the bits that interested me. So I decided to create my own site, called Print & Pattern, in my spare time, and started to share my research with readers. Not many at first, but gradually word got out and eventually hits were counted in millions. Graduates and designers asked to appear on the site to showcase themselves to the many companies that were using it to recruit fresh talent, while I scoured the shops with my trusty spy camera and exposed the exciting design that could be found in London, Paris and New York. Designs are now placed up on the site to be admired and celebrated, as well as to help keep an eye on trends.

When I signed up to the blog software I decided to use a pseudonym, to remain anonymous, and glanced around the room for an idea. I had a new book at the time, about my hero David Bowie, called *Bowie Style*, and thought that would do nicely. Little did I know several years later that the name Bowie would stick.

Soon the love and enthusiasm I have for pattern design was spotted by Laurence King Publishing, who asked if I would like to compile a book on the subject. As a collector of design books, naturally I jumped at the chance to curate my own. And so, here is a selection of works by fabulous designers from all over the world, united by a love of the printed pattern.



They also have their own collection of designer products, and have produced wallpaper, ceramics and fabrics. In 2006 they launched the new brand 'Mini Moderns', for their collection of contemporary designs for children.

Top / Net and Ball
The Southbank Centre asked
Keith and Mark to redraw the
classic design by Peter Moro
and Leslie Martin, the
architects of the Royal Festival
Hall. They changed the
proportions to a much more
workable and commercial scale
for wallpaper, and introduced
a new collection of colours to
create a soft, modernist palette.

Below / Town Square A fabric designed for a 'Mini Moderns' floor cushion. Architectural drawings of buildings and trees populate the pattern which uses a grid layout.







Above / Tick-Tock
Tick-Tock is one of Absolute
Zero Degrees' 'Colour-Me'
wallpapers, designed to be
coloured in, once on the wall.
Twelve clocks of varying styles,
all set at different times, help
children to learn to tell the
time in a relaxed and fun way.



Above / Bees
This wallpaper, created for 'Places and Spaces', features a central honeycomb structure that morphs into bees and butterflies.
The designers wanted the print to feel like a cameo brooch or a rococo mirror, so used the oval shape as a negative space.







Top / Dandelions Created for 'Places and Spaces', the large dandelion clock on this wallpaper explodes to form dragonflies.

Far left / Sitting Comfortably? A cushion from the 'Mini Moderns' collection. "Are you sitting comfortably?" is a phrase that usually precludes a great story.

Left / Tick-Tock Cushion The 'Mini Moderns' floor cushion has crossover appeal to both children and adults.
