



Author's Preface

In the 21st century, with the enhancement of the realization of the need for disease prevention and integrative health care, transformation of the conventional medical model, and understanding of the nature of disease, the international community has become more and more interested in natural approaches to health and healing. The increasing popularity of Chinese medicine in Europe and America, and especially in Asia, has brought about a much broader space for the development of Chinese medicine.

Chinese medical ophthalmology is an integral discipline of Chinese medicine with a history of more than 2,000 years. The unique theory and application was formed on the basis of Chinese medicine and has gradually developed and evolved over the years. Concepts of holism, along with principles of pattern differentiation and treatment, form the base of Chinese medicine. Specialized systems like the five-wheel differentiation, external oculopathy differentiation, and fundus differentiation are unique to Chinese medical ophthalmology. As acupuncture (body acupuncture, scalp acupuncture, ear acupuncture) plays an important role in the treatment of eye disease, methods of acupuncture therapy for eye disorders are emphased in this book.

Although Chinese medical ophthalmology is derived from traditional Chinese medicine, it has a close relationship with modern Western medicine. Wide application of equipments such as fluorescence fundus angiography, ophthalmic ultrasonography, and optical coherence tomography not only expands the examination methods of Chinese medical ophthalmology, but also provides objective evaluation for treatment by medicinal and/or acupuncture therapy. At present, there is not a textbook in the English language combing traditional Chinese medical ophthalmology with current examination means of Western ophthalmology, which may be more acceptable and comprehensible to the ophthalmologists and practitioners of Chinese medicine worldwide. Therefore, the publication of this book will fill this gap.

This textbook is written with the intention to highlight the special features of Chinese medicine. It systematically introduces the basic theory of Chinese medical ophthalmology and the diagnose and treatment for eye diseases. The content was selected to meet the practical needs of modern clinicians of Chinese medicine. The authors have strived to make the language concise and accurate, and adapt theoretical expounding to Western ways of thinking.

In addition to the etiology, pathogenesis, and diagnostic and treatment procedures for each eye disease, this textbook gives detailed explanations of basic TCM techniques commonly used in the ophthalmic clinic, such as external therapy and acupuncture. There is much information presented on chronic eye diseases and retinal degeneration. These conditions can be effectively treated and/or its progression may be slowed or arrested with medicinal and acupuncture treatment.

The book is composed of two parts – the general introduction to Chinese medical ophthalmology and disease pathology. The general introduction includes five chapters, including a brief introduction to the history of Chinese medical ophthalmology, anatomy and physiology of the eyes, common ophthalmic examination methods, the relationship between the eye and *zang-fu* organs and channels, methods of pattern differentiation, internal and external therapy, commonly used acupoints, and

effective acupuncture methods.

The pathology section consists of 10 chapters that introduce 40 eye diseases according to anatomical position (i.e., eyelid, conjunctiva, sclera, cornea, iris, lens, retina, choroids, and optic nerve). Clinically challenging eyes diseases like blepharoptosis, dry eyes, herpes simplex keratitis, ischemic optic neuropathy, retinitis pigmentosa, and optic atrophy, are presented in great detail.

This book is applicable to practitioners of Chinese medicine and integrative medicine in English-speaking countries, especially to the practitioners of Chinese medical ophthalmology. It can also be a reference book for graduate students of TCM and conventional ophthalmologists. However, due to the complexity and variety of clinical medicine, and to the nature of difficult diseases, it is suggested to use this book with flexibility in clinical practice, instead of sticking to a certain medicinal formula or acupoint protocol. A treatment plan should be developed on the basis of pattern differentiation, and suited to the patient's condition, the time of year, and the local climate.

Please see the attached CD for more details on some diseases and manipulation (mainly about acupuncture).

All compilers of the textbook come from notable TCM universities or traditional Chinese medical hospitals in China. They are professors and specialist who have an abundance of scholastic achievement and clinical experience. We anticipate that the publication of this textbook will strengthen the understanding of Chinese medical ophthalmology in clinicians who have a particular interest in treating eye diseases. Our goal is to also promote an academic interchange among the doctors of Chinese medicine, integrative medicine, and Western medicine. Our desire is to further promote an international dissemination of Chinese medical ophthalmology so as to benefit eye patients from around the world.

The accompanying DVD-ROM displays the features of Chinese ophthalmology. It introduces the five-wheel theory (the core of Chinese ophthalmology) and the specific acupuncture manipulations in TCM ophthalmology. The disc also introduces the treatment of several diseases with acupuncture.

Special thanks to Dongfang Hospital of Beijing University of Chinese Medicine and Tianjin University of Traditional Chinese Medicine for their support in the making of the DVD-ROM. We are also sincerely grateful to the software production team for their great efforts and all the patients that appear in the videos for their participation.

Translator's Preface

When I was engaged in postdoctoral studies and working in the United States of America, I kept asking the same questions to my Western friends and colleagues: What do you think about traditional Chinese medicine? Do you know many eye diseases can be treated by TCM? The answer to the second question was almost the same as "no". So, I was very excited by the news that PMPH will publish a series of textbooks to introduce Chinese medicine world-wide, and I was invited to be one of the editors-in-chief of this textbook.

The whole textbook has been translated following the PMPH Publication Guidelines. To keep the language characteristics of traditional Chinese medicine as well as facilitate understanding in readers whose mother tongue is English, most of the terms were first translated literally (wordfor-word), and then explained with their corresponding Western medical terms. For example, \dot{R} ($sh\acute{e}n\ shu\check{t}$) is translated as "spirit water", and its corresponding terms in Western medicine are aqueous humor or tears. However, as the terms yin (\mathfrak{P}), yang (\mathfrak{P}), and qi (\mathfrak{T}) have been accepted widely in the English language, they are just given their $p\bar{t}n\ y\bar{t}n$ spelling without explanation. In the process of translating classic quotes, I was met with tremendous difficulties. Classical Chinese, even for a native-Chinese speaker, makes for difficult reading. The classical Chinese text needed to be translated it into modern Chinese first; to do this without distortion of meaning, the translators discussed terminology issues and sought the advice of famous veteran doctors of TCM. I have found that, by patient and careful handling, even the most cumbrous sentences can be rewritten into clear ones.

My personal gratitude goes to the other two editors-in-chief, Dr. Wei Qi-ping and Dr. Andy Rosenfarb, and the project manager, Ms. Liu Ying, of the People's Medical Publishing House. The translation would not have been finished without their invaluable advice, encouragement, and support.

In a careful final revision of the translation, I have found a number of errors, major and minor; and I fear that others remain undetected. We look forward to receiving any suggestions and criticisms from readers for improving the book for its next edition.
