Notes on Contributors

Christine Bell is Professor of Public International Law and Associate Director of the Transitional Justice Institute at the University of Ulster. Professor Bell read law at Selwyn College, Cambridge (1988) and gained an LL M in Law from Harvard Law School (1990). In 1990 she qualified as a Barrister at law and she subsequently qualified as an Attorney-atlaw in New York. From 1997-99 Professor Bell was Director of the Centre for International and Comparative Human Rights Law at Queen's University of Belfast. She has been active in non-governmental organizations, and was chairperson of the Belfast-based Human Rights organization, the Committee on the Administration of Justice from 1995-97, and a founder member of the Northern Ireland Human Rights Commission established under the terms of the Belfast Agreement. In 1999 she was a member of the European Commission's Committee of Experts on Fundamental Rights. Professor Bell authored the book Peace Agreements and Human Rights (Oxford University Press, 2000), and a report published by the International Council on Human Rights Policy entitled Negotiating Justice? Human Rights and Peace Agreements (2006). In 2007 she won the American Society of International Law Francis Deak Prize for an article on peace agreements. Her most recent book On the Law of Peace: Peace Agreements and the Lex Pacificatoria (Oxford University Press, 2008) won the (UK) Socio-Legal Studies Association Hart Book Prize.

Orna Ben-Naftali is Professor of International Law and Dean of the Law School at the College of Management Academic Studies in Israel. A graduate of the Law Faculty of Tel-Aviv University, the Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy, Tufts University, and Harvard University (History), she taught at Brandeis University and at the Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy, and worked in the Department of Peacekeeping Operations of the United Nations. Professor Ben-Naftali's publications focus on international humanitarian law, most particularly, the law of belligerent occupation; international criminal law; and on the cultural study of law. She is a member of the Editorial Board of the European Journal of International Law; founding member of the Executive Board of Concord — the Research Center for the Interplay between International Norms and Israeli Law, and a member of the Executive Board of B'tselem — the Israeli Information Center for Human Rights in the Occupied Territories.

Paola Gaeta is Professor of International Criminal Law at the Law Faculty of the University of Geneva and Director of the LL. M Programme in International Humanitarian Law of the Geneva Academy of International Humanitarian Law and Human Rights. In February 2010, she joined the Graduate Institute of International and Developments Studies in Geneva as Adjunct Professor. Previously she was Full Professor of International Law at the University of Florence. Professor Gaeta graduated with a degree in Political Science from the University of Florence and obtained a PhD in Law from the European University Institute. She is a Member of the Editorial Boards of the Journal of International Criminal Justice and of the European Journal of International Law. Her publications include The UN Genocide Convention: A Commentary (ed) (Oxford University Press, 2009) and The Statute of the International Criminal Court: A Commentary (co-edited with A Cassese and J R W D Jones, Oxford University Press, 2001).

Andrea Gioia is Professor of International Law at the Faculty of Law of the University of Modena and Reggio Emilia, where he is also a member of the Doctoral School in Legal Sciences. From September 2010, he is on leave from the University of Modena and Reggio Emilia and is serving as Senior Legal Officer at the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) in Vienna. A graduate of the Law Faculty of the University of Pisa, he obtained his PhD in international law at the University of Rome I ('La Sapienza'). Professor Gioia is a member of the Editorial Committee of *The Italian Yearbook of International Law* and is a member of the Italian Society of International Law, the American Society of International Law, and the International Law Association. He served on the Italian Delegation to the Standing Committee on Liability for Nuclear Damage of the IAEA, was the Scientific Advisor to the IAEA International Expert Group on Nuclear Liability, and served as IAEA Consultant.

Marko Milanović is a Lecturer in Law at the University of Nottingham School of Law. He obtained his first degree in law from the University of Belgrade, his LL M from the University of Michigan Law School, and is completing his PhD at the University of Cambridge Faculty of Law. He clerked for Judge Thomas Buergenthal at the International Court of Justice, and has worked for several years for a Serbian NGO, the Belgrade Centre for Human Rights, of which he remains an associate. He has acted as counsel or advisor in cases before the Constitutional Court of Serbia, the European Court of Human Rights, and the International Court of Justice, and has published in leading academic journals.

Marco Sassòli is Professor of International Law and Director of the Department of International Law and International Organization at the University of Geneva. He was Professor of International Law at the Université du Québec à Montreal, where he remains Associate Professor. He is also Associate Professor at the University Laval. He chairs the Board of Geneva Call, an NGO engaging non-state armed actors to respect humanitarian norms, and is Vice-Chair of the Board of the International Council of Human Rights Policy. Professor Sassòli graduated as doctor of laws from the University of Basel and was admitted to the Swiss bar. He worked from 1985–97 for the International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC) at the headquarters, inter alia, as deputy head of its legal division, and in the field, inter alia, as legal adviser of the ICRC delegation in Israel and the Occupied Territories, as head of the ICRC delegations in Jordan and Syria, and as protection coordinator for the former Yugoslavia. His publications and research are dedicated to international humanitarian law, human rights law, international criminal law, the sources of international law and the responsibility of states and non-state actors.

Yuval Shany is the Hersch Lauterpacht Chair in International Law at the Law Faculty of the Hebrew University of Jerusalem. He serves as Director in the International Law Forum at the Hebrew University and the Project on International Courts and Tribunals (PICT). He is a member of the steering committee of the DOMAC project (assessing the impact of international courts on domestic criminal procedures in mass atrocity cases) and is a senior research fellow at the Israel Democracy Institute. Professor Shany has degrees in law from the Hebrew University, New York University, and the University of London. He has published numerous books and articles on international courts and arbitration tribunals, and other international law issues such as international human rights and international humanitarian law. Professor Shany has taught in a number of law schools in Israel, and has been in recent years a research fellow at Harvard and at Amsterdam University, and a visiting professor at the Georgetown University Law Center, Michigan University Law School, the Faculty of Law of the University of Sydney, and Columbia University Law School.

Ana Filipa Vrdoljak is Professor in the Faculty of Law, University of Western Australia and Visiting Professor in the Department of Legal Studies, Central European University, Budapest. She holds a Doctor of Philosophy (in Law) from the University of Sydney. Professor Vrdoljak is a member of the Cultural Heritage Committee and Rights of Indigenous Peoples Committee of the International Law Association. She was Marie Curie Fellow at the European University Institute, Florence (2006–08), where she worked on her forthcoming book entitled Law and Cultural Heritage in Europe. She has been Jean Monnet Fellow, Law Department European University Institute, Florence (2004–05); Visiting Fellow, Faculty of Law, University of New South Wales (2008); Visiting Scholar at the Lauterpacht Centre for International Law, University of Cambridge (1999); and Global Law School, New York University (2000). She is the author of International Law, Museums and the Return of Cultural Objects (Cambridge University Press, 2006) and numerous academic articles on international law and cultural heritage.
