



## **Foreword**

This book was written by a man who loves sports. I know that better than anyone. Don Harrison is my brother-in-law. We've been connected at the hip through college sports and as brothers-in-law for more than forty years.

For whoever would care to know—probably no one—I've had a connection to intercollegiate athletics in Connecticut for almost fifty years. I was a student athlete at Fairfield University in the early 1960s, followed by a twenty-year career coaching baseball, then as an athletics director at three Connecticut colleges: Fairfield University, the University of Hartford and, most recently, Sacred Heart University, where I'm in my twentieth year.

Obviously, there was no way Don and I wouldn't cross paths, having shared the same footprint, albeit from different vantage points over all those years. As irony would have it, it was during a time when Don was covering Fairfield University's participation in the 1973 NIT that he met my sister, Patti, at a postgame celebration at Mama Leone's Restaurant in New York City. It was a love-at-first-sight encounter. Their love story compared to none.

Back to my charge writing a foreword to this book...

Don remembers more about Connecticut sports than anyone I know, albeit professional sports, college, high school or wherever else he finds a story in the Nutmeg State. For better or for worse, he knows more about my career in intercollegiate athletics than I care to remember.

#### FOREWORD

Don is like a right-brain artist. He remembers and captures through his God-given gift of writing thoughts, feelings and reflections in real time, much the way an artist does with a paintbrush and canvas. That's the good news. The bad news is that he has the uncanny knack of remembering things I try to forget. His brain is like a trap. Anything that enters that frontal lobe never leaves, even if I wished it would at times. And just when I think there's a stat or an event that he couldn't possibly remember, he shocks me. He remembers every little detail as if it occurred just after breakfast this morning.

What he remembers and has on file about basketball in Connecticut is astounding. But that's not all. The truth be known, he has fervor for Major League baseball as well. His earlier book, *Connecticut Baseball: The Best of the Nutmeg State*, is a testimony to his passion for that game. Upon reading this edition, most people will agree that he has a special place in his heart for basketball in Connecticut, too.

For Don Harrison, most of the attractiveness about sports is derived from the variety of experiences they offer, combined with the encounters he has had covering them. Don caught most of it in a bottle. Hardly a major basketball event took place over a three-decade period that Don hasn't witnessed personally.

And it's not always about glory and the trophy. Fittingly, Don has always had a special place in his heart, which speaks volumes about him, to remember a sad event that on occasion accompanies sport. After all, it's easy to write about the champion or championship trophy.

One such gut-wrenching experience was the story you will read about Ray Andrade, who was shot and killed in an attempted holdup of a small grocery store on Madison Avenue in Bridgeport. Ray was a schoolboy point guard, starred for Tom Penders at Bridgeport Central and led the Hilltoppers to the 1970 Class L state championship game against Hillhouse. He made second team All-State as a sophomore—and never played an organized game again. This piece by Don was cited in *The Best American Sportswriting 1993*.

No one is better qualified to write about some of the most colorful events and personalities associated with basketball in Connecticut than Don. He has a state, a regional and even a nationwide reputation as an award-winning sportswriter with a gifted perspective about the characters and personalities he has covered or otherwise come in contact with in the

profession. If there ever were a writer who could lift a personality right off the page, it's Don.

Probably no book better captures the spirit and soul of basketball and its influence on the Nutmeg State than this one.
