# Preface to the First Edition

The aim of this book is to provide an authoritative description of the major elements of the American legal system. We are fortunate to have a distinguished group of American law professors write about fields in which they are expert. At times their commentary goes beyond historical development and explanation of the law and legal institutions to encompass critique. In that sense the 18 chapters presented here involve an historical, systematic, and critical introduction to the law of the United States.

The authors are special in another way. In addition to their areas of expertise in American law, each is also knowledgeable about a legal system outside that of the United States. They are comparative lawyers, who bring to their writing the perspective of an outsider as well as that of an insider. They thus see features of American law that are invisible to insiders, who breathe and live the law in which they work. Only strangers will see that certain aspects of the legal system in the United States are unusual, even perverse.

The 18 chapters are ordered in such a manner as, first, to acquaint the reader with the basic structural and cultural elements defining law in the United States: federalism, pragmatism, liberty, and individualism. Distinctive to the United States is also its method of legal education and its unitary legal profession, as well as the ways in which this profession makes use of its sources of law. Second, the authors describe the principal fields of public law: constitutional law, administrative law, labor law, and criminal law. Third, the traditional core of private common law in America is presented: contracts, torts, and property. The remainder of civil and commercial law follows, including family law, inheritance law, commercial transactions, and business enterprises. Finally, procedure rounds out the book with a description of criminal procedure, civil procedure, conflict of laws, and a discussion of an illustrative American case.

This book is intended primarily for two audiences. First, it is directed at the growing international audience interested in learning about the law of other countries. It provides students, lawyers, judges, scholars, business persons, and administrators outside the United States with the basic information required to understand America's principal legal concepts and institutions. Each chapter ends with a selected bibliography so that the interested reader can pursue further research in specific legal areas. Second, the volume is aimed at the American law student or general student perhaps interested in law, who desires a reliable overview of the American system of law.

Introduction to the Law of the United States has a number of features to facilitate its use. The 13 page table of contents presents a detailed outline to acquaint the reader with the major divisions in American law. For a specific inquiry the lengthy index exhaustively covers the contents of the various chapters. It includes, for instance, an alphabetical listing of all the statutes cited.
