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Preface

Basic Spanish Conversation is a functional course designed to develop oral language skills at the beginning and intermediate levels. This book may be used as 1) the principal text in a Spanish conversation class, 2) a text to provide valuable reinforcement of oral skills in a more general Spanish course, or 3) a text for individuals studying on their own who wish to improve their conversational skills or brush up on their Spanish.

Each of the 18 units in this book focuses on specific language functions (activities) of everyday life, for example, asking and giving personal information, describing places and their location, asking and giving simple directions. The language and structures needed to perform these language functions successfully constitute the basis of each unit. The material in the text is presented in order of difficulty, progressing from the more simple and frequently used forms such as the present tense to more complex structures, including the compound and subjunctive tenses.

The units are each divided into sections A and B. Individual sections in a unit deal with different aspects of a common language function and cover a range of themes, such as school, work, travel, leisure activities, daily routine, shopping, eating out, public services, and many others. The aims of each section are clearly stated at the beginning, so that you will know beforehand the kind of communicative competence you are expected to achieve.

New material is presented through a variety of formats. These include dialogues, interviews, reading passages, letters, brief articles from newspapers, written instructions, questionnaires, photographs, maps, notices, advertisements, timetables, and official forms. Each of these is followed by a set of individual, paired, or group activities requiring the use of spoken Spanish. The instructions preceding each exercise explain the theme or situation and the type of activity involved. Role-playing exercises are an important feature of this conversation text.

Oral practice is often related to everyday surroundings and experience. You are asked to talk about your family, home, studies, likes, dislikes, interests, vacations, or plans for the future.

Words and idioms used in *Basic Spanish Conversation* are listed in the alphabetical Spanish-English Vocabulary at the end of the book. Much of this vocabulary will be elicited in the practice section.

The *Unit Summary* that follows Section B in every unit contains a list of the main language functions that have been practiced, each with examples taken directly from that Unit. This summary is a useful reminder of what you should be able to do with the language after finishing the Unit. It is desirable to refer to the *Unit Summary* and to the *Structure and Vocabulary Review* that follows to study specific points of grammar and usage or to review the entire Unit before moving on to the next one.

A Teacher's Guide that accompanies *Basic Spanish Conversation* for use with this text in school settings contains general information about the book as well as detailed suggestions for presenting new material to classes and guidelines for conducting the varied activities recommended in the book.
