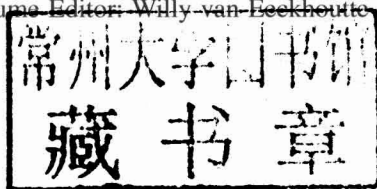

Prof. Dr hab. Andrzej Marian Świątkowski (born 17 January 1944 in Warsaw) studied law and sociology at the Jagiellonian University in Cracow (1961–1969). He gained a degree in law (1966) and an MA in sociology (1969). After two years clerking at the district court in Cracow, he received a doctorate in labour law from the Institute of Legal Sciences of the Polish Academy of Science in Warsaw (1972).

Dr Świątkowski studied at the Columbia Law School in New York. He gained an LLM degree in labour law from the University of Pennsylvania in Philadelphia (1977). In Poland, he received the habilitation degree from the Jagiellonian University in Cracow in the field of labour law and social

policy (1976).

Dr hab. A. Świątkowski spent a year as distinguished research fellow at the National Institute of Public Management in Washington, DC (1977–1978). After returning to his post at the Jagiellonian University, he was appointed to the position of extraordinary professor of law (1984) and ordinary professor of law (1991).

Professor Świątkowski spent one semester as a visiting scholar at New York University School of Law and another semester as a visiting professor at Indiana University. He lectured at various universities in Europe, United States, Argentina, and Australia. He delivered papers at International Industrial Relations Association congresses in Dublin, Helsinki, Oslo, Sydney, Tokyo and Santiago de Chile.

Three of his former doctoral students employed currently at the Jagiellonian University received a habilitation and one was appointed to the position of extraordinary professor of labour law at the Jagiellonian University Faculty of Law

and Administration. He also served as an external reviewer of three doctoral theses at the Andhra University in India and one in Vilnius (Lithuania). He was asked to submit professional opinion to support a candidate applying for honorary doctorate at Harvard University and professorship at Vilnius University in Lithuania. Professor Świątkowski has published more than 600 studies, articles, and reviews and thirty-one books in the field of Polish, international, comparative, and foreign labour law, social security law, and social policy.

In 2002, Professor Świątkowski was elected by the Committee of Ministers of the Council of Europe to serve as an international expert on the European Committee of Social Rights (former Committee of Independent Experts) in Strasbourg.
